### W. D. Weeks.

The subject of this sketch was born in Benton, Carlton county, New Brunswick, January 20, 1864 and was 44 years, 7 months and 13 days old at the time of his death. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and mother in St. Johns, and two brothers: Herbert, living in Winneconne, Wis., and Robert, in Lake City, Michigan.

Mr. Weeks was well known in St. Johns and everyone who knew him was his friend. He was honest, straightforward, kindly disposed to all, quiet and unassuming. He was a faithful member of the Methodist church and was secretary of the board of trustees of that church. He was also a member of the Masonic and Modern Woodmen fraternal societies. He was a member of the school board of this district and took great interest in the welfare of our schools. He was a good citizen, a kind neighbor, a loving husband and dutiful son.

Mr. Weeks had been suffering, but not seriously for some time with heart trouble, but was taken suddenly ill on June 5 and continually grew weaker until he passed away on July 3d.

The funeral was held at the Methodist church, Sunday, July 5, Rev. Young conducting the services. Interment was made in the Riverside cemetery under the auspices of the Modern Woodmen, the Masonic fraternity through some misunderstanding taking no part in the services.
