Our citizens who favor the new Home telephone system must not be too highly tickled over the prospects of its installation—provided that those who seek the franchise are the same cheap skates who played horse with the little city of St. Johns, on the Willamette.

That the system is an excellent one there is no doubt; but that those who were at the head of the company in Portland did not have any real business was shown a couple of years ago. The Home company desired a permit to get into St. Johns, promised to pay for the publication of the ordinance, (less than \$50) and agreed to erect a building within a brief time. In fact it promised most any old thing.

When the ordinance was published stood off the printer week after week and it is a question whether it has ever paid for it. It possibly has; but the building it was to erect has never materialized, and so far as we learn the site has not been purchased. By the terms of the franchise all rights have been forfeited—and not a wire of the company has been strung. Only the citizens were STUNG.—Astoria Leader.

An Ordinance Establishing the Grade of Hayes Street from the South Line of Catlin Street to the South Line of the Weyerhaeuser Tract, in Said City and Accepting the Profile.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That the grade of Hayes Street from the South line of Catlin Street to the South line of the Weyerhaeuser tract in the city of St. Johns be and the same is hereby established in accordance to the profile thereof, which said profile was made by C. E. Andrews, City Engineer, and filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 28 day of July, 1908, which said profile is hereby adopted and approved and said grade established from the South line of Catlin Street to the South line of the Weyerhaeuser tract in said City in conformity therewith.

ORDINANCE NO. 190

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Buchanan Street in the City of St. Johns, from the Easterly Line of the Willamette Boulevard to the Westerly Line of Dawson Street in the City of St. Johns, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The city council of the city of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Buchanan street from the easterly line of the Willamette boulevard to the westerly line of Dawson street in the city of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of the common council of the city of St. Johns, dated June 23, 1908, and recorded in the office of the city recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, at St. Johns on the 3d and 10th days of July, 1908, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which affidavit is on file, and the legal posting of notice of such street improvement as estimated by the city engineer, and said sum as estimated by the city engineer as costs thereof, or such sum as shall finally be fixed and determined by said city engineer, not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts of land in their several proportions in the said assessment district of said Oswego street from the Northerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Barton's Addition in the city of St. Johns in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots and tracts of land abutting, proximate and adjacent thereto, and as being especially and particularly benefited by said street improvements of said Oswego street heretofore declared and now designated as all lots, parts of lots and tracts of land from the marginal lines of said Oswego street back to the city charter of said city, and that said assessment be apportioned as in the charter of said city directed.

ORDINANCE NO. 191

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Oswego Street, From the Northerly Line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly Line of Barton's Addition in the City of St. Johns, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of the City Liens.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The city council of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Oswego street from the Northerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Barton's Addition in the city of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of the city council of said city, passed on the 3d day of June 1908, and of record in the office of the city recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation at St. Johns, on 5 and 12 day of June, 1908, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which affidavit is on file, and the legal posting of notice of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of the city engineer on file with the recorder, and no remonstrances having been filed, as provided by said resolution the sum \$4,185.38 being said engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost of said improvement, but which shall be more accurately determined by the city engineer. The time within which said improvement is to be completed is hereby fixed at 60 days from the date of the last publication of the notice for proposals for said work, which proposals must be filed with the recorder of said city on or before the 25th day of August, 1908, at 4 o'clock P. M. of said day.

Now therefore, it is hereby ordered that said Oswego Street from the Northerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Barton's Addition in the city of St. Johns be improved accordingly and that said recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, and published in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, including proposals for making said improvement and the sum to be assessed by the city engineer as costs thereof, or such sum as shall be finally fixed and determined by said city engineer, not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts of land in their several proportions in the said assessment district of said Oswego street from the Northerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Barton's Addition in the city of St. Johns in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots and tracts of land abutting, proximate and adjacent thereto, and as being especially and particularly benefited by said street improvements of said Oswego street heretofore declared and now designated as all lots, parts of lots and tracts of land from the marginal lines of said Oswego street back to the city charter of said city, and that said assessment be apportioned as in the charter of said city directed.

That all the property so included in said improvement district as aforesaid is hereby declared to be local improvement district No. 5.

The city recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment hereby made, in the lien docket of said city of St. Johns, and cause notice to be published as provided by law and the city charter of said city, and that said assessment be apportioned as in the charter of said city directed.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns: That whereas, there are delinquent street assessments for improvement thereof of a number of lots, parcels and tracts of land in the city of St. Johns, which said assessments have been duly and regularly entered in the docket of city liens and the sum assessed upon each lot so delinquent has not been paid to the Recorder; and

Whereas, more than thirty days have elapsed since said assessments were entered in said lien docket; and

Whereas, the city of St. Johns is authorized under the provisions of its charter to collect said assessments by sale of said property;

Therefore be it resolved that the recorder of said city be and he is hereby directed to prepare and transmit to the Treasurer of the city of St. Johns a list in tabular form, made up from the docket of the city liens describing each assessment which is delinquent, the name of the person to whom assessed, and a particular description of the property, the amount of the assessment due thereon and other facts pertaining thereto which he may have in his possession; and

Be it resolved that the treasurer of said city shall thereupon proceed to collect the unpaid assessments as provided by the law of the State of Oregon and the City Charter of said city, and that said property be sold as therein provided and that the cost of advertising and making said sale be taxed as by law provided against each lot, tract or parcel of land so sold.
