## Proposals for Street Work

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the city recorder of the city of St. Johns, Oregon, until 1 o'clock P. M. on the 25th day of August, 1908 for the improvement of Buchanan street from the easterly line of Willamette Boulevard to the westerly line of Dawson street by grading, graveling and sidewalk walking same in the manner provided by ordinance No. 190 and the charter of said city and in accordance to the plans, profiles and specifications of the city engineer, now on file in the office of the city recorder.

Separate proposals may be made for either the grading, graveling or sidewalk walking included in said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the mayor for a sum not less than 10 per cent of the contract price, and no bid will be considered unless accompanied by such check, and upon blanks furnished by the city recorder for such purposes.

Said improvement must be completed on or before the 25th day of October, 1908. The rights to reject any all bids is hereby reserved.

The estimate cost of said improvement is \$4927.42.
