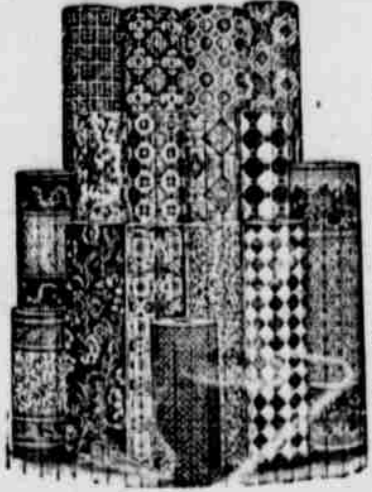

### A NARROW ESCAPE.

The following from our esteemed townsman needs no comment:

Friends, Markle & Byerlee: We arrived in Minneapolis O. K. but 12 hours late. Found real Eastern weather—very cold. I want to tell you how near we came to being in the most terrible wreck I have seen for a long time.

Our train was five hours late at Butte, Mont., and they sent out another train on our time. It crashed into a freight 40 miles below Livingston. Twentyfour were killed and 40 injured. We were held six hours at Livingston and our train had to stop at the wreck. I tell you it was a terrible sight. Those dead laid out on the grass and the engine and cars reduced to a scrap pile. I thought of how fortunate we were being late, and the many who were kicking about going so slow.

### LOST VALUABLE HORSE.

A. F. Trumbo, one of our draymen lost a valuable horse Wednesday morning at the St. Johns stop on Jersey street. Mr. Trumbo drove up to the drug store to get a bottle of turpentine and while waiting for it the car came in. Mr. Trumbo's horse was a little bit afraid of the cars and he had his hands full taking care of his team and could not give any attention to the animal tied behind the car. As the car came up the horse tied behind became frightened and jumped on the track. The car struck him, knocked him down and the wheel passing over one leg between the hock and the fetlock, crushed the bone. Captain Black was called and shot the horse a few moments later.

Mr. Trumbo says the car was running very rapidly or the motor man could have stopped before striking the animal. The cars have the habit of coming up to this stop at full speed and there have been a number narrow escapes, but this the first serious accident here. Mr. Trumbo has made a claim against the company for the horse as he thinks the accident was due to the highrate of speed of the car and lack of care on the part of his motorman. He valued the horse at \$200.
