## BIG REALTY SALE

A real estate transfer of importance was that made Monday by the Columbia Arms Investment Company to M. L. Holbrook. The deal covers a tract of 71 1/2 acres of land at Smith's crossing, near St. Johns. The consideration was \$90,000. The land in question is a portion of the 100-acre tract purchased by William Killingsworth and associates last January for the sum of \$65,000.00. Their profit amounts to 25,000.00, and they still retain approximately one-fourth of the acreage. The sale is considered a significant one as it shows the increasing values of real estate on the Peninsula.

The tract is located at Smith's crossing, near where the St. Johns car line crosses the Spokane, Port land & Seattle track. Mr. Holbrook intends to cut the property up into city lots. Streets are to be graded, water mains laid and sidewalks put in, as is being done in other suburban districts. Fessenden street, which extends through the property is to be widened and paved, in conjunction with the property owners along the same highway.

The Columbia Arms Company retains the remainder of the 100-acre tract which extends from the O. R. & N. to the Columbia slough. The deal was manipulated by R. G. Brand and is one of the best of the many good deals he has made during the two years he has been operating as a broker at Maegley Junction. Mr. Brand is one of the liveliest, most progressive realty men on the Peninsula.

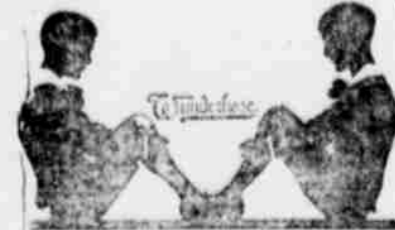
