

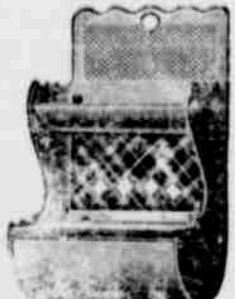

JAMES W. HISEL.

James W. Hisel was born in Madison county, Kentucky, May 10, 1844 and died Sunday night at midnight November 8th. When he was seven years old he went with his parents to Missouri and was married there to Miss Arrhanna Harvey, August 2, 1861. To them were born eight children, six boys and two girls, six of whom survive their father. Their names are: Charles, whose home is in Shell City, Mo.; Joe, James, Geo. W., Richard Hisel and Dollie Bevens, all of whom live in St. Johns. Charles came from his home in Missouri and all the children were at the bedside of their father during the closing of his life.

Mrs. Hisel died 18 years ago and Mr. Hisel came to Oregon March 12, 1905 and has resided here since. He has been feeling ill for the past three months and been confined to his bed for just seven days before his death. The immediate cause of his death was heart failure.

The funeral services were conducted at the Christian tabernacle by Rev. J. R. Johnson Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, where a large number of his friends gathered to pay their last respects to him. He was always a highly respected man, by all who knew him and at the recent revival meetings followed his Lord in Baptism. Interment was made in the Rose City cemetery.
