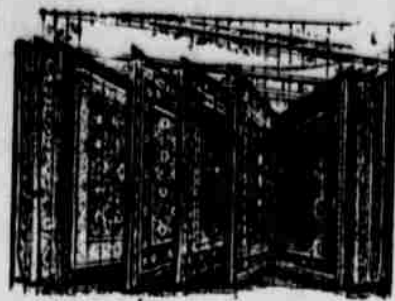

DONALD MACLACHLAN.

Rev. Donald MacLachlan died Nov. 28th, at the Good Samaritan Hospital Portland, following a serious operation which was undertaken as a last resort.

He was born in Strath Lachlan, Argyleshire, Scotland, in 1839, and came with his parents at an early age to America; when they settled in Nova Scotia. Later he came to the United States, was educated at Oberlin College and went South where he entered the ministry. He was engaged in active work for 34 years, having retired from the ministry about five years ago. He was ever noted for unflagging zeal, untiring energy in his work and a fine sense of justice and honor. He was a member of one of the oldest families in Scotland. He leaves a widow and two daughters, Miss Margaret and Dr. Mary MacLachlan, who have the most earnest sympathy of all their many friends in this hour of sorrow.
