That a copy of this resolution be kept on record in the office of the city engineer and that the same shall be published for two consecutive publications in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper. That the city engineer within three days from the first publication of the first resolution shall cause to be posted in at least two places on the Philadelphia street notices headed, "NOTICE OF CHANGE OF GRADE" in letters not less than one inch in length, and such notice shall in legible characters state that such resolution has been passed by the Council and the date thereof and shall state briefly the change of the grade proposed; and the time within which written objections or remonstrances against the same shall be made; and the said city engineer shall file with the recorder of the city of St. Johns, an affidavit of the posting of said notices, which affidavit shall contain the time when, and the place where said notices were posted.

RESOLUTION.

BE IT RESOLVED by the city of St. Johns, that it deems it expedient and necessary to change the grade of Philadelphia street in the city of St. Johns, from the West line of Hayes street to the City Dock in said city, from the present grade to grade proposed by Charles E. Andrew, City Engineer, the change therein is described as follows, to-wit:

From Hayes street to Fillmore street by changing the same from 13 per cent to 9.3 percent; from Fillmore street to Edison street from 11.5 per cent to 9.3 per cent; from Edison street to Decatur Street from 14 per cent to 9.3 per cent; from Decatur street to Crawford street change from 7.4 per cent to 5.3 per cent; from Crawford street to Bradford street change from 4 per cent to 5.3 per cent; from Bradford street to railroad track change from 3.4 per cent to 5.3 per cent; and that the grade of said street between the west line of Hayes street to the city Dock in said city be established according to the profile of the said Charles E. Andrew.

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Proposals for Street Work.

Sent proposals will be received at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns, until March 23rd, 1909, at 4:00 o'clock, P. M., for the improvement of Stafford street from the South line of Mohawk street to the north line of Van street in the manner provided by Ordinance No. 218 subject to the provisions of the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and the estimate of the city engineer, on file.

Holds must be strictly in accordance with printed blanks, which will be furnished on application at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns. And said improvement must be completed on or before 60 days from the date of the signing of the contract by the parties thereto.

No proposals or bids will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the mayor of the city of St. Johns, certified by a responsible bank for an amount equal to ten per cent of the aggregate proposal.

NOTICE OF Special Election

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to the provisions of ordinance No. 217 of the city of St. Johns, passed and approved February 23, 1909, published February 26, 1909, and the general laws of the state of Oregon, a special election will be held in said city of St. Johns and in the territory hereinafter described, which is proposed to be annexed to the city of St. Johns, on Monday the 5th day of April, 1909, for the purpose of the Spokane and Portland, the proposal to alter the boundaries of the municipal corporation of the said city of St. Johns and include in, and annex to the said city of St. Johns new territory, which said alteration of the said boundaries and the new territory so proposed to be included in said city of St. Johns is described as follows, to-wit:

"Beginning at the Northeast corner of Section One (1), Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West of the ... diameter Meridian; thence East to the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough; thence East following the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough to a point Eighty (80) feet from the West side line of Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Co's right of way to the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough; thence East to the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough; thence East following the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough to the Northeast corner of the Four and One Half (4 1/2) acre tract of land owned by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Company; thence Southeastly along said line to the most Easterly corner thereof; thence Southeastly along said line to the most Easterly corner thereof; thence Southeastly along the Easterly line of said tract to a point One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet North from the North line of the County road known as Columbia Slough road; thence Westly along the present Portland City boundary parallel with, and One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet from, the North line of said tract to a point which is intersected by a Northeastly extension in a straight course of the West line of 'Ida' street, as located on the map of Northern Hill Acres; thence Southwesterly along said extension, and westerly side line of 'Ida' street, and an extension thereof, to the center of the main channel of the Willamette river; thence Northwestly following the center of the main channel of said river to a point which is intersected by a Westerly extension in a straight course of said North boundary line of Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West of the Willamette Meridian; thence East along said extension, and said line to the West line of the O. R. & N. R. R. right of way; thence Easterly along the Northwestly line of said right of way to a point which is intersected by the North boundary of Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West on the North line of the Northeast Quarter of Section One (1) Township and Range aforesaid; thence East to the place of beginning."

The electors of said city of St. Johns and the territory so proposed to be included in, and annexed to the said city are hereby invited to vote upon said proposition by placing upon their ballots the words "For Annexation" or "Against Annexation," or words equivalent thereto.

The following places have been designated by said ordinance as polling places for said election. For first ward of the city of St. Johns at 209 West Burlington street. For the second ward of said city of St. Johns at the City Hall.

For the territory so proposed to be annexed at North School in Holbrook Addition, Block 21, and Holbrook Building at Smith's Crossing.

The following judges and clerks of such special election have been duly and legally appointed and designated by the council of the city of St. Johns, viz: Judges for the First Ward of the city of St. Johns: John Poff; P. T. Hanson; Marion Johnson.

Smith's Addition to the Town of St. Johns, Multnomah county Oregon, be set aside, cancelled, annulled and held for naught, so far as said deed affects the plaintiff's (Jennie Forbes) fee simple title to an undivided one third interest in said lots also her dower interest in said lots.

Second-That the mortgage executed by Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes, on the 30th day of April, 1906, recorded on the 29th day of August, 1906, in Book No. 378, at page 29, Mortgage Records for Multnomah county, Oregon, by which it appears the said Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes conveyed to you all of lots numbered three and four in Block numbered Six, T. P.
