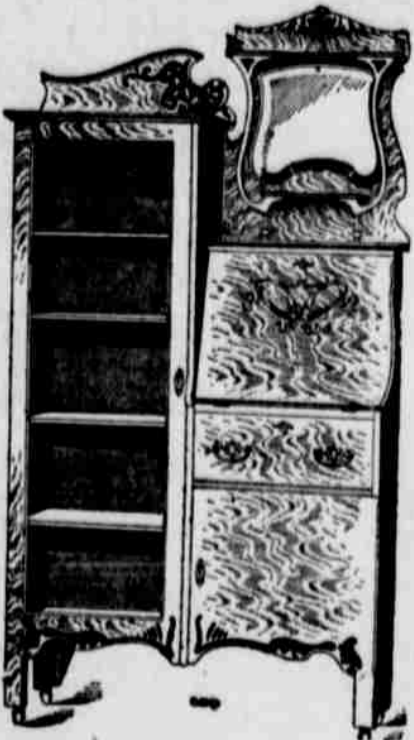

## RESOLUTION.

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns, that  
Whereas, on the fifth day of May, 1908, the city council, by resolution duly passed, deemed it expedient to change and alter Willis Boulevard of said city by widening the same, to-wit: By including in said street and making a part thereof the following described tract of land:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot 19 in Hill's Addition to the city of St. Johns; thence South 35 degrees, East 177.5 feet to the Westerly side line of Fessenden street; thence North 56 degrees, East 30 feet; thence North 35 degrees, West 177.5 feet; thence South 56 degrees, West 30 feet to the place of beginning, and to appropriate and condemn the above described tract of land for the purpose of widening Willis Boulevard, and

Whereas, the city engineer thereafter and within twenty days, made such survey, report and plat and filed the same with the city recorder, which said report and plat was there after adopted by ordinance embodying such report, and that thereafter and within sixty days, the council appointed three disinterested free holders of the city of St. Johns possessing the qualifications of jurors of the Circuit Court of Multnomah county to view such proposed change and make assessments of the damages and benefits, caused by said change, and

Whereas, the viewers so appointed, filed their said report, which said report was by said council rejected, and the council thereupon ordered said viewers to again view said proposed change and to file their report, which said report was filed on the 13th day of August, 1908, and was thereafter adopted by ordinance embodying said report, and

Whereas, all the assessments levied against the property especially benefited by such change of said Willis boulevard having been fully paid,  
Now therefore, be it resolved by the city of St. Johns, that said Willis boulevard be and the same is hereby altered and changed by widening the same, and that the following tract of land be, and the same is hereby declared to be public street, to-wit:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot 19 in Hill's Addition to the city of St. Johns; thence South 35 degrees, East 177.5 feet to the Westerly side line of Fessenden street; thence North 56 degrees, East 30 feet; thence North 35 degrees, West 177.5 feet to the place of beginning, and to appropriate and condemn the above described tract of land for the purpose of widening Willis Boulevard, and

Whereas, the viewers so appointed, filed their said report, which said report was by said council rejected, and the council thereupon ordered said viewers to again view said proposed change and to file their report, which said report was filed on the 13th day of August, 1908, and was thereafter adopted by ordinance embodying said report, and

## RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns, that it deems it expedient and necessary to alter Richmond street by extending the same from the Northernly line of the Severance Addition to Columbia boulevard in said city and to condemn a certain triangular piece of ground belonging to said Severance tract to be used as a street, thereby extending Richmond street; the same to be sixty (60) feet wide from that certain tract of land owned by Nancy Caples to the City of St. Johns to be used as a street and known as Richmond street to the Northernly line of Columbia boulevard in said city.

And be it further resolved by the city of St. Johns that the city engineer be and he is hereby directed to make a survey of such change and extension of Richmond street and to make a plat of the same and a written report containing a full and complete description of such extension of Richmond street, and the boundaries thereof, and of the portion of each lot and tract of land to be appropriated therefor, and to make such survey, report and plat thereof and to file the same with the recorder of said city within twenty days from the date of this resolution unless the council grant him further time.
