There are three railroads here. They are the O. R. & N., the North Bank, the Seattle.

The chief industries are manufacturing and commerce.

We've a city hall that has grounds of green grass all year.
There is a river here about five times as large as the big creek, and ten times as deep. Great ships come up the river, some so large they couldn't get in the big creek. It is called the Willamette river. We are all proud of its name. On the river is built a great dock.
St. Johns owns a planing mill, a flour mill, a woolen mill, a veneering factory, a turpentine plant, an asbestos factory, the Marine Iron works, two ship building plants, two saw mills and many others.

ORDINANCE NO. 225.

AN ORDINANCE ALTERING AND CHANGING THE CITY BOUNDARY OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS AND INCLUDING NEW TERRITORY THEREIN AND DIRECTING THE CITY RECORDER OF ST. JOHNS TO MAKE AND TRANSMIT TO SECRETARY OF STATE A CERTIFIED DESCRIPTION OF SUCH ANNEXED TERRITORY AND AN ABSTRACT OF SUCH VOTE CAST AT THE SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ANNEXING SAID TERRITORY, STATING THE NUMBER OF VOTES CAST IN THE SAID ANNEXED TERRITORY IN FAVOR OF ANNEXATION AND AGAINST ANNEXATION, AND THE NUMBER OF VOTES CAST WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS IN FAVOR OF ANNEXATION AND AGAINST ANNEXATION, AND REQUIRING THE CITY RECORDER TO TRANSMIT A COPY OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ORDER TOGETHER WITH A CERTIFIED DESCRIPTION OF THE TERRITORY SO ANNEXED WITH THE ABSTRACT OF THE VOTES TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE, AND DIRECTING THE CITY RECORDER TO ENTER SAID ORDINANCE AND ORDER UPON THE RECORDS OF SAID CITY.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That whereas, there was, on the 23rd day of February, 1909, filed with the city recorder of the city of St. Johns a petition signed by more than one-fifth of the qualified electors of the city of St. Johns, and shown by the vote cast at the last municipal election held therein, requesting that the boundaries of the City of St. Johns be enlarged and altered so as to include new territory therein, which said territory is hereinafter described, requesting that said territory become a part of said city, and that a special election therefor be held and the question submitted to the electors of the city of St. Johns and the electors residing in the proposed territory hereinafter described, proposed to be annexed to said city and become a part thereof, and

Whereas, on the 23rd day of February, 1909, the city council of the city of St. Johns passed an ordinance No. 217 entitled, "An ordinance to provide for a Special Election, appointing Judges and Clerks, and designating polling places and directing publication and posting of notices to alter the boundary of the Municipal Corporation of the city of St. Johns, and include new territory therein," and

Whereas, notice of such special election was given by publication in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation in said city and in such territory proposed to be annexed, for a period of four successive weeks prior to such election, to-wit: February 25, March 5, 12-19-26, 1909, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file with the recorder of said city of St. Johns; and

Whereas, a like notice was posted in four public places in said corporation and the proposed territory to be annexed as shown by the affidavit of the Chief of Police of the city of St. Johns on file with the recorder of said city, which said notice distinctly stated the proposition to be submitted to said electors, and designated specifically the boundaries of the territory so proposed to be annexed inviting the electors to vote upon such proposition, and

Whereas, said ordinance ordered a special election designating the time and place when the same should be held and the polling places and when the polls should be open within the city of St. Johns and the territory to be annexed, which were the usual polling places used for that purpose within the city of St. Johns and within such territory proposed to be annexed, which said notice and ordinance designated and appointed the judges and clerks to act thereat, and

Whereas, pursuant to said petition, ordinance and notice, such special election was held in the city of St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon, and in said proposed territory, as provided by Section 2690, Title 27, Chapter 1, B. & C. Code and Statutes of Oregon on the 5th day of April, 1909, between the hours of Nine o'clock a. m. and Seven o'clock p. m. of said day, and

Whereas, the council of the city of St. Johns met on Monday next succeeding such election at One o'clock p. m. of said day in the council room of the city hall of said city, and a quorum being present thereat, proceeded to canvass the vote cast at said special election for and against such annexation; that said council in special session first canvassed the votes cast in such territory so proposed to be annexed, and

Whereas, it appeared from said canvass the votes cast in said territory that there was a total of sixteen hundred and fifteen votes so cast in said territory proposed to be annexed were in favor of annexation and one against annexation, and that thereupon next proceeded to canvass the votes cast within the city of St. Johns, and from said canvass it appeared that in the city of St. Johns there was cast on said proposition a total of 455 votes, of which 353 were in favor of annexation and 102 against annexation, and

Whereas, at said special election there was a majority of votes cast in the proposed territory so proposed to be annexed in favor of annexation, and that there was a majority of the vote cast in the city of St. Johns in favor of annexation, it is therefore ordained and ordered by the city of St. Johns that the following described territory, to-wit:

Beginning at the Northeast corner of Section One (1), Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West of the Willamette Meridian; thence East to the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough; thence Easterly following the center of the main channel of Columbia Slough to a point Eighty (80) feet from the West side line of Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Company's right of way to the center of the Oregon Slough; thence at right angles Eighty (80) feet to the West side line of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Company's right of way; thence Southwesterly along the west line of the Spokane, Portland &

Seattle Railway Company's right of way to a point in the line, before indicated, to the center of the Columbia Slough if extended; thence Easterly along the center of Columbia Slough extended to the Northwesterly line of the Four and One-half (4 1/2) acres tract of land owned by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Company; thence Southwesterly along said line to the center Easterly corner thereof; thence Southwesterly along the Easterly line of said tract to a point One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet North from the North line of the County Road known as Columbia Slough Road; thence Westerly along the present Portland city boundary parallel with, and One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet from the North line of said County Road to a point which is intersected by a Northerly extension in a straight course of the West line of Ida street as located on the map of Northern Hill Acres; thence Southwesterly along said extension, and Westerly side line of Ida street, and an extension thereof, to the center of the main channel of the Willamette river; thence Northwesterly following the center of the main channel of said river to a point which is intersected by a Westerly extension of the North boundary line of Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West of the Willamette Meridian; thence East along said extension and said line to the West line of the O. R. & N. R. R. Right of Way; thence Easterly along the Northwesterly line of said right of way to a point which is intersected by the North boundary of Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West of the Willamette Meridian; thence East to the Northeast Quarter of Section One (1), Township One (1) North, Range One (1) West, and East to the place of beginning; THE AND THE SAME IS HEREBY ORDERED AND DECLARED TO BE A PART OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, and that said territory is hereby annexed to said city and it is hereby ordered that the recorder hereof and the city recorder hereof of this city of St. Johns enter a copy of this ordinance and order upon the records of said city and that the said city recorder is further ordered and directed to make and transmit to the Secretary of State a certified description of such annexed territory and abstract of such vote, which shall show the whole number of electors voting in the city of St. Johns and the number of votes cast in said territory each for and against annexation.

ORDINANCE NO. 226.
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARIES OF THE MAYOR, COUNCILMEN, CITY ATTORNEY, CITY RECORDER, CITY TREASURER, CITY ENGINEER, CHIEF OF POLICE, AND THE NIGHT POLICE OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1: The salary of the Mayor of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$3.00 per night for each regular meeting night.
Section 2: The salary of the Councilmen of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$2.00 per night for each regular meeting night.
Section 3: The salary of the City Attorney of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$75.00 per month.
Section 4: The salary of the City Recorder of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$100.00 per month.
Section 5: The salary of the City Treasurer of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$35.00 per month.
Section 6: The salary of the City Engineer of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$112.50 per month.
Section 7: The salary of the Chief of Police of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$85.00 per month.
Section 8: The salary of the Night Police of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at \$70.00 per month.

In the name of the State of Oregon you are hereby summoned and required to appear and make answer to the complaint of plaintiff filed against you in the above entitled suit, on or before Saturday, the 17th day of April, 1909, which date is subsequent to the expiration of six weeks after the 25th day of March, 1909, the 5th of March being the date of the first publication of this summons, and it is prescribed by the order for publication of this summons that the same be published once a week for six consecutive weeks. If you fail to so appear, the plaintiff will apply to the above entitled Court for the relief prayed for in her complaint in this suit, to-wit:

First—That the deed executed by Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes, dated April 20, 1906, recorded on the 28th day of August, 1906, in Book No. 385 at page No. 379-380, Deed Records of Multnomah county, Oregon, by which it appears that the said Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes conveyed to you all of lots numbered one and two, in Block numbered Six, P. T. Smith's Addition, to the Town of St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon, be set aside, cancelled, annulled and held for naught, so far as said deed affects the plaintiff's (Jennie Forbes) fee simple title to an undivided one third interest in said lots also her dower interest in said lots.

Second—That the mortgage executed by Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes, on the 30th day of April, 1906, recorded on the 29th day of August, 1906, in Book No. 278, at page 89, Mortgage Records for Multnomah county, Oregon, which mortgage appears the said Alexander Forbes and Jennie Forbes conveyed to you all of lots numbered three and four in Block numbered Six, P. T. Smith's Addition to the Town of St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon, to secure the payment of \$2500, with interest thereon from April 30th, 1906, at the rate of seven per cent per annum, be set aside, cancelled, annulled and held for naught, so far as the same affects plaintiff's fee simple title to an undivided one third interest in said lots and her dower interest in the balance of said lots.

If you neglect or refuse to so convey to plaintiff her said interest in said lots one and two or release from the force and lien of the aforesaid mortgage, her said interest in said lots three and four, and also her dower interest in the remaining two thirds of said lots three and four, and if you neglect or refuse to so convey to plaintiff her said interest in said lots one and two, and as a release of her said interest in lots three and four from the force and lien of said pretended mortgage, and that you be certified copy of such decree be recorded in the deed and mortgage records of Multnomah county, Oregon.

Fourth—That you be forever restrained and enjoined from setting up or claiming any estate, right title or interest in or to plaintiff's undivided one third fee simple interest or to her dower interest in said lots one and two and three and four, and from foreclosing or attempting to foreclose the aforesaid pretended mortgage, and that you be certified copy of such decree be recorded in the deed and mortgage records of Multnomah county, Oregon.

Fifth—For such other, further or different relief as the Court may seem, meet and just in equity.

Sixth—For judgment against you for costs and disbursements incurred in this suit by plaintiff.
