

wife preceded him to the  
grave. The surviving chil-

Johns; Samuel Holcomb of Odessa,  
Wash., and Elmer Holcomb also of  
Washington state.

### TO WATER USERS.

sprinkling yards or sidewalks or  
washing windows must be paid for  
in advance, and used only between  
the hours of 5 and 8 a. m. and 5  
and 9 p. m. It must not be used for  
sprinkling streets. Any one using  
water contrary to these rules, or  
wastefully, will be shut off without  
further notice. If paid in advance  
for the months of June, July, August  
and September entitles the user to  
water for this purpose until January
