## Busy Session of Council

Continued from first page.

The matter was referred to the water and light committee to have the matter attended to.

Upon suggestion of the mayor Chas. Broderson will sharpen the tools and look after other blacksmithing work that may be needed at the rock crusher. This will be a saving of time and money to the city and keep Charley in practice in an art in which he is a past master.

The mayor appointed L. F. Clark, R. C. Clark and P. Hill as special policemen at the sufficient salary of \$1.00 per year, the appointments being ratified by council.

The G. A. R. requested permission to use the new dock for holding Memorial services there Sunday, May 20th, but as the dock has not yet been accepted no definite action could be taken.

It was decided to retain the services of J. J. Chambeau for the purpose of auditing the city books up to date, when the statement will be published so no criticism need be in the dark concerning the receipts and disbursements of the city.

The question of placing the two additional lights provided for on Jersey street was left to the discretion of the water and light committee with power to act.

The fire department requested permission to hold a picnic about June 6th on the rock crusher grounds at Whitcomb Court, which was apportioned.

President of Council Doble fathered a project to use the foot of Pessenden street as a dumping ground for the off fallings of the city until a more suitable location could be provided. Carried.

An ordinance condemning property for street purposes on Buchanan street passed the council, as did also an ordinance establishing the grade on Richmond street, Willis boulevard to Columbia boulevard.

A resolution to open and widen

Pessenden street, Jersey to the Willamette river, was adopted.

An ordinance to establish the grade on Portland boulevard, Pessenden street to line of Point View, was passed, as was also an ordinance adopting the report, plat and survey of the city engineer of land to be conditioned for the purpose of extending Richmond street.

A resolution to improve Portland boulevard, Oswego to Pessenden streets, was adopted.

Messrs. K. C. Couch, H. W. Bonham and A. M. Stearns were appointed as viewers on Buchanan street condemnation, and Chas. Linquist, P. Hill and Thomas Cochran as viewers on Richmond street.

Adjourned to Friday evening.
