A successful but delicate operation was performed upon Mrs. Henry Gosney last Friday by Drs. DeVaul and MacLachlan. Mrs. Gosney is now getting along nicely and is in a fair way of recovery.

Mrs. J. Hart, a nurse, was stricken suddenly with ptomaine poisoning as a result of eating canned tomatoes at Marshfield last Friday. She fainted and fell down stairs and was severely bruised. She is seriously ill.

Mrs. Harry Hemlow of Vancouver, B. C., is visiting relatives and friends in this city. She is a daughter of Mrs. Nancy Caples and was the first person to buy a ticket from Vancouver to St. Johns over the North Bank line.

Guy P. Tozer, after a couple of week's sojourn at the home of A. W. Markle, has returned to Pittsburgh, Pa., where he will remain indefinitely. He was very favorably impressed with this western country of ours, and says that it is more than likely to attract him back again before many months have passed by.

There seems to be something mysterious under way along the water front. Engineers have been busy off and on for several months at the foot of Richmond street and all along the bottom of the rise, but no information as to the reason for this surveying has yet come to light.
