The price of radium is now \$5,000,000 a pound of 12 ounces. This price has been established by an order given to a British company by Lord Iveagh, of the Fairfax Castle, for seven grams, which is little less than one-quarter of an ounce and for which they have contracted to pay \$150,000. The radium is to be used in experimental work in an institution recently founded for the investigation of cures for cancer.

The bar survey now in progress at Fort Stevens, Or., shows a channel across the crest of the Columbia river bar from 28 to 31 feet in depth and of large width, sufficient for the passage of any craft afloat at moderate tide. The measurements have been taken at mean low tide. High tide runs from five to eight feet usually, and at times a foot higher, giving plenty of water over the bar for the heaviest laden vessels.

One of the most important real estate deals consummated this year was closed Friday when W. A. Spanton acting for the Spanton Co., acquired the County Poor Farm adjoining the City Park at Portland.
