## ORDINANCE NO. 256.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE GRADE OF POLK STREET IN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS FROM THE SOUTHERLY LINE OF WILLAMETTE BOULEVARD TO THE SOUTHERLY LINE OF CRAWFORD STREET.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That the grade of Polk street in the city of St. Johns between the Southernly line of Willamette boulevard and the Southernly line of Crawford street in said city be and the same is hereby established according to and in conformity with the profile thereof on file in the office of the city recorder, which said profile has been examined and is hereby adopted and approved.

## ORDINANCE NO. 255.

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT OBSTRUCTIONS IN THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, AND TO PROVIDE A PENALTY THEREFOR, AND TO DECLARE WHEN OBSTRUCTIONS IN THE STREETS ARE A NUISANCE AND TO PROVIDE FOR REMOVING THE SAME.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1: That no building, house, booth, stand or other structure or any portion thereof now or hereafter erected, altered or repaired shall be allowed to project over or into or remain standing upon or within any walk or street or unimproved street or alley of the city of St. Johns, provided that this section shall not apply to drinking fountains or monuments, or to swings that are placed 8 feet above the sidewalk. And provided further that this section shall not include overhead porches and balconies of hotels, halls or public buildings.

Section 2: That any person or persons, firm or corporation violating the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the municipal court of the city of St. Johns shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the city jail not more than Fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3: That any building, house, booth, stand or other structure, or any portion thereof, placed or erected or left remaining or suffered to be placed, erected or left remaining within or upon any street or alley in the city of St. Johns, except drinking fountains, monuments or awnings more than 3 feet above the sidewalk and also excepting overhead porches and balconies of hotels, halls or public buildings, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, unless the owner or occupant of such building, house, booth, stand, or other structure, or any portion thereof, shall abate or cause to be abated, or remove or cause to be removed the same within 48 hours after receiving notice from the Chief of Police of said city so to do.

Section 4: That it shall be and is hereby made the duty of the chief of police or police department of the city of St. Johns and they are hereby authorized and empowered to remove or cause to be removed any and all of such obstructions from the streets whereever found.

Section 5: That a written or printed notice demanding the removal of any structure enumerated in Section 1 of this Ordinance, signed by the chief of police, and posted upon such building, house, booth, stand, or other structure or any portion thereof shall be deemed sufficient notice within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 6: That each day that such building, house, booth, stand or other structure, or any portion thereof is allowed or suffered to remain in any street or alley in the city of St. Johns, shall be deemed a separate offense and shall be punished in the manner provided by Section 2 of this ordinance.

Section 7: In as much as there are certain buildings now standing and in course of construction in the streets of St. Johns, an emergency is declared to exist and that this ordinance shall become effective and be operative from and after the approval of the Mayor.

## RESOLUTION.

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns:

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Polk street, from the Southernly line of Willamette boulevard to the Southernly line of Crawford street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner to-wit:

By grading same to established grade or grade to be established, by cut and fill, and by sidewalking same on both sides with concrete sidewalks, 5 feet wide 12-foot curb, said walk and curb to have expansion joints when directed by the city engineer, said curb to have 4-inch tile drains every 50 feet; also by placing the necessary wooden cross walks and box gutters. That a strip of macadam be placed in the center thereof, (full length) said macadam to be 18 feet wide, 8 inches in center, 6 inches on either side.

All of said work to be according to the plans and specification of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the terminal of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said Polk street, from the marginal line of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 30."

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Polk street is \$3359.20.

That the cost of said Polk street to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.

## RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns:

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Portland boulevard, from the Southernly line of Fessenden street to the Southernly line of Thompson street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading same to the established grade by cut and fill, and by sidewalking same on both sides thereof with 6-foot wooden sidewalks, 12-foot curb with necessary 5-foot wooden crosswalks and box gutters.

All work to be done under the direction of the city engineer and according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the terminal of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said Portland boulevard from the marginal line of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 29."

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Portland boulevard is \$4,689.98.

That the cost of said Portland boulevard to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Recorder of the city of St. Johns, until Tuesday October 12, 1909, at 4 o'clock, p. m. for the improvement of South Jersey street from the Southernly line of Richmond street to the North line of Mohawk street in the manner provided by ordinance No. 254 subject to the provisions of the Charter and Ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and the estimate of the City Engineer, on file, which plan requires 6-foot cement walks on each side and macadam 16 feet wide the entire length.

Bids must be strictly in accordance with printed blanks, which will be furnished on application at the office of the Recorder of the city of St. Johns. And said improvement must be completed on or before 60 days from October 12th, 1909.

No proposals or bids will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the Mayor of the city of St. Johns, certified by a responsible bank for an amount equal to ten per cent of the aggregate proposal.

For the 200 feet of walk has been granted, to be completed with the contract.
