The rooming house at the corner of Leavitt and Ivanhoe streets, which has been vacant for a number of months, has been leased and is now ready for business.

David M. Campbell and Viola C. Fassett, both of St. Johns, were united in marriage at the Evangelical parsonage Tuesday afternoon, Rev. C. P. Gates performing the ceremony.

The Seattle exposition cleared over \$200,000 as a result of the fair. It takes the western people to teach the Eastern brethren how to make a financial success out of expositions.

Revival meeting will be held in the Baptist church next Sunday evening. Rev. A. E. Smith, pastor of the Arleta Baptist church will have charge of the services. The services will continue every night during the following week.

The new Stine building of three rooms on Jersey street has been leased. Kilkenny & Epps will occupy the room on the south, the Portland Electric Co. the middle apartment, and Geo. J. Perkins and H. Henderson the room on the north.

South Jersey street and Mohawk are now under course of improvement. Hard surface streets and cement sidewalk obtain in each instance, and the work is being done under the skillful supervision of Contractor Thomas Cochran.

Cap Snow has once more moved his office, this time from the McDonald block to Philadelphia street. He says he is not working under the theory of it "being cheaper to move than pay rent," but is owing entirely to force of circumstances.

Thornadyke while the latter was publishing a paper in Astoria, and afterward pledged the same to the Kelso State Bank, has been apprehended at Roseburg and was taken to Kalama, Wash. to stand trial for obtaining money under false pretenses.

The movement is a praiseworthy one and should have the support of the entire community.
