Local News.

Work on the bridges over the North Bank cut doesn't seem to be progressing any too rapidly for some reason.

In publishing the names of the surviving sons of the late Samuel W. Simmons last week we inadvertently omitted that of Albert.

This will be one of the first apartment houses to be erected on the Peninsula, and it will contain five suits of two and four rooms each.

The doctor has spent many laborious hours in filling in and seeding his large lawn, and as a result he can now boast of one of the finest lawns in St. Johns.

On last Friday the party departed for San Jose and other points in California, where they expect to remain until next spring. Miss Stalter will attend school in the land of flowers and orange blossoms the coming winter.
