**A Mammoth Industry**

Mr. Fred Gunn, of the Gunn Sectional Bookcase Company, for the past month has been traveling over Oregon searching for a location for a branch of their vast Grand Rapids, Michigan, factory. During this time he visited Eugene and Oregon City with the idea of locating there, but decided that neither place was exactly suitable for an establishment of the magnitude which he wished to start to supply the Pacific Coast Territory. He then changed his search for a suitable location to this city and we understand from reliable authority that he has practically decided to locate on the Swift tract south of the packing plant. Our understanding is that a factory larger than the Swift plant will be built and that employment will be given to 700 men. Not only does this company manufacture book cases, but desks, office furniture and in fact furniture of all descriptions. A factory employing 700 hands means an increase of at least 3500 in the population of the city and in addition will give employment to a large number of men, to supply the wants of this army of workers. Portland has long needed factories and a pay roll and the advent of the Swifts on the peninsula was only a beginning to the large number of Eastern firms who will recognize Portland as the logical manufacturing center of the Pacific Coast.—Abstract.

**RESOLUTION**

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns. That Whereas, M. G. Nease on the 24th day of August, 1909, entered into a contract with the city of St. Johns to operate for a period of two years, the rock crusher belonging to said city, and Whereas, the city of St. Johns desires to have contained in said contract a provision to provide for crushing rock of certain sizes and dimensions for the purpose of making concrete walks and roadways, which said dimensions are hereinafter described, and Whereas, it will be necessary to supply said rock for the said M. G. Nease to install other and additional machinery, screens and appliances, and Whereas, the said M. G. Nease desires to enlarge the plant now in operation at said crusher by adding additional crushers, bins, loading apparatus, etc., and Whereas, the life of the contract now existing between said M. G. Nease and the city of St. Johns is insufficient duration to authorize the expenditure of the money necessary to install the additional machinery, appliances, bunkers, etc., as aforesaid, and Whereas, the council believes it to be for the best interest of the city of St. Johns that the plant be enlarged as above indicated. Now, therefore be it Resolved, that the mayor be, and is hereby authorized to enter into a contract with the said M. G. Nease, containing the same provisions as the contract now existing between the city of St. Johns and the said M. G. Nease, for a period of five (5) years, from the 24th day of August, 1909, the said contract to terminate on the 23rd day of August, 1914, and that said contract contain further provisions, as follows:

Concrete shall be crushed from dark blue basalt rock and free from dirt, loam or clay and passed through dust screens; no particle of rock shall be greater than two (2) inches in the largest dimensions nor smaller than (1-2) one-half inch in its smallest dimension; and that such rock shall be furnished to the contractors improving the streets or other work in the city of St. Johns in such quantity as they may require, and under same provisions as is now required in the contract now existing with the said M. G. Nease to furnish rock for macadamizing purposes; and that said contract may contain any further conditions and restrictions or limitations as may to the said mayor seem to be the best interest of the city of St. Johns, that the price of said rock shall not exceed \$1.10 per yard to the contractor or contractors, and the city to receive as royalty from said concrete rock two and a half (2 1/2) cents per cubic yard so furnished.

**ORDINANCE 275.**

**An Ordinance Accepting a Deed from Charles J. Backstrom and Anna Backstrom to the City of St. Johns.**

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That a certain deed made and executed by Charles J. Backstrom and Anna Backstrom, his wife, of Multnomah county, Oregon, to the city of St. Johns, a municipal corporation, and dated on the 11th day of September, 1909, and acknowledged on the 11th day of September, 1909, before N. F. Noren, a notary public for Oregon, conveying the following described land, to-wit:

Commencing at the northeasterly corner of lot 1, block 2, in Backstrom's addition to the city of St. Johns, running thence northerly and parallel with the westerly side line of John street, in said city, to the southerly side line of Portland Boulevard; thence easterly along said line of said boulevard 60 feet thence parallel to the easterly side line of John street to the northwesterly corner of lot 12, block 1 of said Backstrom's addition; thence westerly at right angles 60 feet to the place of beginning.

Commencing at the northwesterly corner of lot 1 block 2, in Backstrom's addition to the city of St. Johns, thence northerly and parallel with the westerly side line of lot 1 to the southerly line of Portland boulevard; thence westerly along southerly side line of said boulevard 30 feet; thence southerly and parallel with the east line of lot 3, block 6, Backstrom's addition, 17 1/2 feet; thence easterly at right angles 30 feet to the place of beginning.

Be and the same is hereby accepted together with the land therein conveyed, for the uses and purposes as in the deed set forth.

**ORDINANCE NO. 274.**

**An Ordinance Accepting Deed from the Roman Catholic Arch-Bishop, of the Diocese of Oregon, a Corporation, by A. Christie, Arch-Bishop, To Certain Lands in the City of St. Johns for Street Purposes.**

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That a certain deed made on the 7th day of January, 1910, by Roman Catholic Archbishop of the Diocese of Oregon by A. Christie, Archbishop, to the city of St. Johns, which said deed was acknowledged on the 7th day of January, 1910, before Arthur C. Dayton, notary public, in conveying to the city of St. Johns certain land for street purposes, to-wit:

Beginning at an iron pipe at the intersection of the center line of the Portland Boulevard and the easterly side line of Point View addition to the city of St. Johns, run thence southeasterly along the center line of Portland Boulevard in Point View, extended 390 feet to a point; thence run south 20 degrees 15 minutes west and parallel with the southeasterly side line of Point View addition, 39.3 feet to an iron pipe; thence northwesterly and parallel with the center line of Portland Boulevard 390 feet to an iron pipe; thence run along the southeasterly side line of Point View addition 39.3 feet to the place of beginning, containing in all 15,327 square feet, or .331 acres more or less.

Be and the same is hereby accepted together with the land therein conveyed, for the uses and purposes as in the deed set forth.
