ANNOUNCEMENT.

Since the municipal election is rapidly approaching, much thought and care should be exercised in selecting the men who shall handle the reins of government in this city during the next term. Good councilmen, we believe, are of more importance than are the balance of the officials, because in their hands lie the power to transact the business of the city. Therefore, it behooves the voters of St. Johns to weigh carefully the qualifications and adaptability of the various candidates now seeking an aldermanic seat. Personal feelings should not be permitted to predominate in making the selection, but the good of the city should be paramount. The candidates on both tickets for councilmen are good men, but some are more adapted for the position than others, and therefore, too much care cannot be taken in making selections.

Big Boxing Event

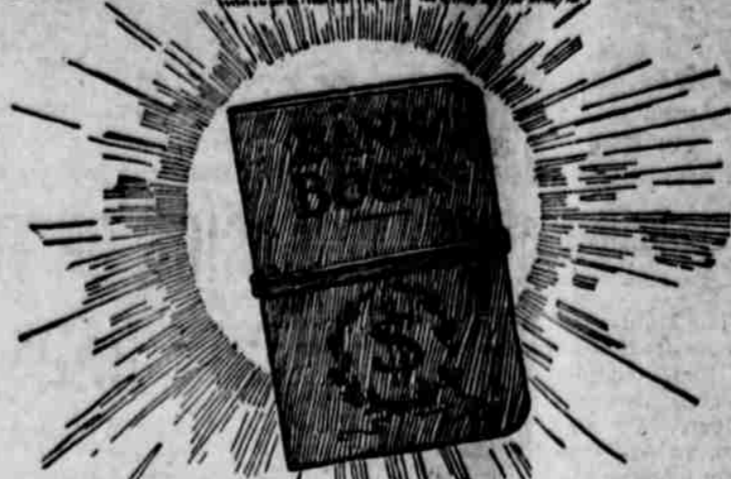

RESOLUTION.

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns, and the council of said city hereby ordered that an election be held in accordance with the requirements of the charter of the city of St. Johns, Oregon, on the first Monday in April, 1910, for the purpose of selecting city officers for said city, to-wit: A mayor, a city recorder, a city attorney, a city treasurer, three councilmen at large, two councilmen from the first ward two councilmen from the second ward, in the manner provided by the charter and the laws of said city.

And it is further ordered and resolved that at said election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the city of St. Johns the following proposition to amend sections 17, 20, 21, 41, 42, 66, 71, 102 of the municipal charter of the city of St. Johns as proposed by resolution of the council of said city.

And it is further ordered and resolved that at said election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said city of St. Johns the proposition as to whether or not the council of the city of St. Johns shall or shall not issue license for the sale of intoxicating liquor. To be designated FOR LIQUOR LICENSE. AGAINST LIQUOR LICENSE.

And it is further ordered and resolved that the city recorder be, and is hereby authorized and directed and required to at once post and publish, as required by law and the charter of said city of St. Johns, notice of said election, and have printed the necessary and proper tickets for said election and that he procure the necessary poll books and tally sheets for said election, and make all necessary and proper arrangements to enable the qualified electors in said city of St. Johns to hold said election.

And it is further ordered and resolved, and the council does hereby appoint as judges and clerks of said election: Judges of the first ward: P. T. Hanson, John Foll, B. T. Leggett. Judges of the second ward: L. B. Chipman, S. W. Rogers, F. W. Hysman. Clerks of the first ward: Marion Johnston, Otis Leonard. Clerks of the second ward: Chas. Bailey, A. D. McDonald.

The chief of police of said city of St. Johns shall do and perform all necessary and proper acts requisite under the law and charter in carrying out the provisions of this resolution and order, and shall post in three public places in the city of St. Johns, not less than ten (10) days prior to said election, notices of said election to be furnished him by said recorder.

And it is further ordered and resolved that the polling place for the voters of the first ward shall be at the West Burlington street and that the polling place for the voters of the second ward shall be in the city hall.
