

What Would Jesus Do?

What would Jesus do among a lot of primitive savages, each seeking to overpower, rob and destroy the other? Would it be possible here to carry out all those grand and noble principles which he taught? Should they smite him upon one cheek, would he turn the other? Would he say, in effect, "Smite also my wife, destroy my child?" (We must consider the problem from the standpoint of a husband and father.)

We think at least any human follower of Christ would fight, would use deception, would lie, would even kill, if necessary, to protect his own. From any human standpoint he would be justified. In fact, to do otherwise would be culpable. To fight in a good cause is justified in all religious teachings. It violates the commandments, it is far from carrying out the principles which Christ taught, it merely recognizes the impossibility of doing so under certain circumstances. Yet to do his whole duty under the circumstances, a man must spare no effort to change those unfavorable circumstances. If among savages, by teaching them, not only the beauties of love and all the virtues, but a definite form of government, which by putting an end to individual struggles renders it possible to develop those virtues.

What would Jesus do in the business competition of today? Are there not the same individualistic struggles here rendering it necessary to protect self and loved ones at the expense of others? Is it here any more possible to carry out Christian principles, or do we not merely justify the failure to do so on the grounds of necessity? It is just as much a duty to provide for as to defend our loved ones, hence, we justify the means by the end.

Would Jesus, by most honorable methods to be sure, seek to attract trade away from his brother across the street? Would he look with satisfaction upon the growth of his own business and his own fortune to immense proportions, and congratulate himself upon his superior ability in the arts and cunning tricks of the trade, well knowing that his success means failure to others, who because of relatively inferior ability in those arts go down to ruin and poverty? Would he upon any terms accept wealth, which means the power to command the services of others, and implies that others must be in a position of necessity to perform that service, or would he with his loved ones go down to poverty and the necessity to serve?

Financial success is entirely relative. If each had a million they would be in the same position as if each had nothing. It is the hunger of the unfortunate that gives wealth its power.

The business man will contend that he is not responsible for the incapacity of his rival, and the savage might with equal force maintain that he is not responsible for the relative physical incapacity of his enemy. Each must defend himself. Neither is he his brother's keeper. He can't be. If he tries he will only fail to care for himself and family.

So in this condition of industrial and financial savagery, the business man is perhaps justified to fight for his own protection; but why pretend that it is carrying out Christian principles, and why make no effort to change business conditions from that of feudalism to Democracy, or some condition that will render a more Christian life possible?

Business life is a gamble, a game of chance and skill. A man may work with hands or brain at something useful to mankind, he will not be rewarded fairly unless he also successfully plays the game. And in this game, the winnings may be so used to control the deal that it becomes a "sure thing" bunk game. "A square deal" is more impossible than among the card sharps in the days of a certain sheriff in our county who did not try to enforce a "square deal" but to stop the whole nefarious business.

A square deal, indeed! Is this our highest conception of justice, that the securing of bread for our loved ones remains a competitive game to which the slang of gamblers so aptly applies, while we idly and ineffectually talk about a "square deal"? Among savages, a fair deal, no favors, and let them fight it out. Among business gamblers, whether willing or unwilling participants, a square deal, and let the losers starve.

ORDINANCE NO. 281

An Ordinance Adopting the Engineer's Report in the Matter of Extending Polk Street through the Jones Tract in the City of St. Johns.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That whereas, the council of the city of St. Johns did on the first day of March, 1910, by resolution, direct the city engineer to make a survey, plat and written report of the proposed extension of Polk street from the Nancy Caples tract to a point intersecting Polk street, formerly known as Lehigh street, in the city of St. Johns, which said report was adopted on the first day of March, 1910, and

Whereas, said engineer has filed a written report containing a full and complete description of said extension of said street and of the boundaries thereof, and the portion of each lot and tract of land to be appropriated therefor, and has made a survey and plat thereof, which are on file with the recorder of said city, which said report is as follows, to-wit: St. Johns, Oregon, March 8, 1910. To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Description of the land to be condemned for Polk street extension through the Jones tract is as follows: Beginning at the northeasterly corner of lot 1, block 2, in St. John's Heights addition, which point is south 71 degrees east 692.5 feet from the initial monument of St. Johns Heights addition; thence north 17 degrees 30 minutes east 84.8 feet to the south line of Dawson street; thence run south 71 degrees 17 minutes east along the southerly line of Dawson street 60.3 feet to a point; thence run south 17 degrees 30 minutes west 85.1 feet to the north line of St. Johns Heights; thence run north 71 degrees west 60.3 feet to the place of beginning; containing in all 512.3 square feet and being .0395 more or less parts of a 2.1 acre tract owned by W. D. Jones.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns,

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Kellogg street from the southerly line of New York street to the northerly line of Chicago street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading same to established grade or grade to be established by cut and fill and sidewalk same on either side full length with six-foot cement walk 12-foot curb, and by placing a strip of macadam 16 feet wide, eight inches deep in the center, six inches on either side, said walk and curb to have expansion joints as directed by the city engineer, curb to have four-inch tiles every 8 feet.

All work to be according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are here by approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the terminal of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said Kellogg street from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 33."

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Kellogg street is \$174.13.

That the cost of said Kellogg street to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.
