In its present state it is almost impossible to use the street with a team of horses, whereas if it was planked, it would provide a fine driveway the entire distance for hauling of any nature. This street has ever been a dangerous one, and every year it is becoming more so. Therefore, since the project of its improvement is being launched, it is to be hoped that none will stand in the way of its improvement as proposed. The march of progress demands that this street be improved, and any party objecting is an impediment to the development of St. Johns.

Amos M. Roberts, a pioneer of St. Johns, died at his home on Williams avenue Friday last, aged about 77 years. He was born in Binghamton, N. Y., and came to St. Johns in 1857, purchasing 100 acres of land, which is now part of the Weyerhaeuser tract in the north end. He was married in 1858 to Mary Susan Caples, who together with five children survive him. The deceased was well and favorably known here where he has resided for 57 years. The funeral took place Monday afternoon, interment taking place in Riverview cemetery. Mr. Roberts realized about \$50,000 from the sale of his realty holdings here and therefore, was in affluent circumstances. Paschal Hill, E. D. Hurlbert and W. D. Knight of this city, John Mock and Frank Walker of Portland, and Martin Crandall of Linton, all old time friends of the deceased, acted as pall bearers.

John Verdigan, who has been dangerously ill at the St. Vincent hospital for some time with spinal meningitis, is slowly recovering and the chances for his complete recovery are very bright.
