Receipts at this market for the week have been: Cattle 2142, calves 190, hogs 945, sheep 3611, H and M 98 and goats 180. The cattle market has been slightly draggy; sheep have sold briskly on an ascending market and the hog market recovered about 20 cents from the low point of last week. A good many California cattle were among the receipts and while the cows and butcher stuff sold at high prices the steer market was slow and sellers found difficulty in disposing of their offerings. A great many more cows could have been sold without affecting prices, but the over proportion of good quality steers militated against an evenly balanced market. There was a brisk demand for sheep and anything that was fat brought good prices. In the offerings there were not many sheep of good quality in the matter of flesh and the demand for lambs and fat mutton was only supplied in part. Receipts of local territory hogs were next to nothing and prices advanced 15 to 25c over the low point registered last week. D. O. Lively, General Agent.

RESOLUTION.

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns: That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Portland boulevard from the east side line of Point View addition to the westerly line of Fairhaven street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to-wit:
By grading same to established grade by cut and fill and by placing a cement sidewalk on the easterly side line of said street 6 feet wide, 12-foot curb, full length and by placing a cement sidewalk on the westerly side of said boulevard, six feet wide, 12-foot curb from the easterly side line of Point View to the westerly side line of Burr street according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.
That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all lots, parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said Portland boulevard from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That the city engineer's estimate of the probable total cost of said improvement of Portland boulevard is \$193,650.

ORDINANCE NO. 302.

An Ordinance Amending No. 160 of the City of St. Johns, Entitled an Ordinance in Relation to the Construction of Sidewalks, Passed by the Council and Approved by the Mayor, February 4, 1908.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That section six of ordinance No. 160, of the city of St. Johns, entitled: "An Ordinance in Relation to the Construction of Sidewalks," passed by the council and approved by the mayor, February 4, 1908, be, and the same is amended so as to read as follows:

SAND

Section 6. All sand must be clean, sharp sand.
Section 7. That section seven of ordinance No. 160, of the city of St. Johns, entitled: "An Ordinance in Relation to the Construction of Sidewalks," passed by the council and approved by the mayor, February 4, 1908, be, and the same is amended so as to read as follows:

CONCRETE

Section 7. Upon the foundation prepared as heretofore specified will be laid a bed of concrete three inches in thickness, to be made as follows: The cement and sand will be thoroughly mixed dry and made into a mortar with the least possible amount of water; to this will be added the broken stone thoroughly drenched with water, but containing no loose water in the heap. The concrete shall be made of three parts by volume of sand to five parts by volume of broken stone or gravel, together with sufficient Portland cement to make one cubic yard of concrete with each barrel of cement, constituting a one, three and five mixture. The concrete shall be measured, rammed in place, and a barrel of cement shall mean three hundred and eighty pounds of Portland cement, net weight. The rock shall be incorporated immediately with the specified measure of mortar and thoroughly mixed. It shall then be spread and at once thoroughly compacted by ramming until free mortar appears on the surface. The upper surface shall be made exactly parallel with the surface of the completed work. Mortar and concrete shall not be mixed in greater quantities than is required for immediate use, and none remaining unused until set shall be remixed or used in any way. The whole operation of mixing and laying of each batch of concrete shall be performed as expeditiously as possible.
