Death of Allen Cota

Allen Cota, a young man 23 years of age, who has made St. Johns his home for the past six years with his mother, Mrs. Joseph Cota, 518 Allegheny street, met a sad and sudden death while performing his duties as head brakeman on one of the Portland Lumber Co.'s logging trains at Ranier, Oregon, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 3, at 2:15 o'clock. While switching cars on a siding making up a train bound for the river, he was running alongside of a carload of logs trying to release the air brake, and in some unknown manner the brake lever struck him in the temple knocking him to the track where one truck of the car of logs passed over him before the engineer could stop train. The engineer running back found him under the car. Putting his body on the engine, they rushed as fast as steam could take them to the incline 5 miles below, for medical assistance. He rallied on the way and recognized those around him, and after constantly muttering for his mother died one hour and thirty minutes after. Besides his mother and father, he leaves two sisters, Mrs. G. Norene of St. Johns and Miss Rose Cota of Portland, and a brother, Albert Cota of Astoria. His body was laid to rest at Ranier.
