Many there are who deplore the fact that the new city dock was ever built, claiming it was a monumental blunder. Yet these same people would not be willing to sell the dock as it stands for three times what it cost the city three years ago. Is it a blunder to purchase something that increases in value 200 per cent in three years? If it is, we would like to have a few of the same kind of blunders to our credit. While it was a mistake not to have provided for sidetracks when the dock was constructed, yet as it stands the dock was a splendid investment, and any time the people are willing sidetracks can yet be provided.

Why the Review should be censured for upholding home rule, or in other words, favoring staying out of Portland, is more than we can understand. Has the paper not the same privilege of standing up for what it believes to be right and the proper course to take on the annexation question as any citizen in St. Johns? We surely have a right to express our opinion, and we have freely offered space to any one differing with us, even challenged them to take up the issue with us and discuss it in a sane manner. Because none have so far taken advantage of this opportunity is no reason why we should keep silent. There are men in St. Johns who refuse to listen to reason on any subject, and these are the sort that get "sore" at a newspaper when it takes either one side or the other. When the liquor question came up we refrained from taking either one side or the other editorially and offered either side an opportunity to express their views. Yet two persons got so "sore" that they stopped their paper because we did not take up the "dry" side of the argument. In that instance we had nothing particular at stake. As to annexation we have, and any one with red blood in his veins would fight to a finish if the situation involved

as much to them. So far one man, a rabid annexer, has stopped his paper because, presumably, we cannot see the question in the same light as himself. Whether he will refuse to do business with merchants of St. Johns because they do not look at the matter in the same light as himself is hard to tell, but it would be consistent for him to do so. We have nothing to say about the man, but we do regard the act as a most despicable one. As far as losing the subscription is concerned, it is like putting a finger in a bucket of water, pulling it out and then looking for the hole. On the whole, we are glad to have men with such narrow, contracted views removed from the list. So if there are any more in St. Johns who want to suppress free speech, who are opposed to reading anything in the way of argument against their belief, who believe a newspaper has not the same right to argue the matter as the man on the street corner, who is the enemy of all who cannot see the issue in the same light as himself, who has such a narrow, cramped, little soul that he is opposed to reasonable argument, we invite him to come to the office and stop his paper. We will publish his name in the paper so the whole community may know what a brave hero (?) he really is. We intend to keep hammering away until election, and then if the majority is in favor of annexation we shall have no fault to find. In any event, we expect to still do business at the same old stand. If the newspaper business is unprofitable in the event of annexation, we shall still conduct a job printing business until the time comes when a newspaper will be enabled to keep alive in St. Johns. We have nothing but the kindest feeling toward all that differ with us on the annexation question. It is their right, and a man may be a man for all that.

The blowing up with dynamite of the Los Angeles paper was a most deplorable affair. That there are such fiends in the world is almost inconceivable. The printers are not to blame for what appears in a newspaper. They obey the commands of the editor-in-chief, and what appears in the paper or what does not appear is absolutely nothing to them. And yet, these are the ones that had to suffer in this damnable outrage. The party responsible for the utterances escaped and the property was insured to the full limit. The business of the newspaper will be increased instead of diminished by the act. What, therefore, was gained? Widows and orphans are left to suffer. It is not believable

We clip the following from yesterday's Oregonian concerning Paul Cochran, son of Thos. Cochran of this city, who had his collar bone broken while practicing with a football squad:

Paul Cochran, right tackle and captain of the Lincoln High School football team, broke his collar bone while practicing with his squad yesterday on the West End grounds, near the City Park. The accident will keep him out of the game for the rest of the season.

He was engaged in scrimmage work against the second team when he was bumped hard, receiving the fracture. Dr. Herbert W. Hegele was summoned immediately. The young man was removed to his home, 502 Richmond street, St. Johns, in the doctor's automobile.

The fracture was almost in the same spot in which one was received two years ago. The player will not be confined to his bed but will lose the use of his arm for several weeks.

The loss of Captain Cochran this year means much, for he was regarded as the mainstay of the team. Big, strong, a heady and fearless player, he was the terror of the opponents' offense last year, and in the game against Jefferson High School last Saturday he did more tackling than any man on either team. He was all-star tackle last year.
