

Measures to be Voted On

For the benefit of the voters we publish a list of the official ballot titles of each of the 32 initiative and referendum measures to be voted on November 8th. There are enough of them to keep the voter busy from now until election trying to digest them:

(Continued from last week.)

A bill for a law to create the county of Deschutes, Oregon, out of the northwest portion of Crook county, Oregon, providing for its organization, the salaries of its officers, and settlement of the finances between the proposed county and Crook county.

350—Yes.

351—No.

A bill for an act providing for the creation of new towns, counties and municipal districts (excepting drainage and irrigation districts) of less than one county or changing the boundaries of existing counties by a majority vote of the legal voters of the territory within the boundaries of the proposed municipality, and providing that 30 per cent of the number of legal voters within each territory may petition for the creation of a new municipal corporation, and the method of procedure to create the same.

352—Yes.

353—No.

An amendment of section 10 of article 11 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, permitting counties to incur indebtedness beyond \$5000 to build permanent roads, and providing that debts for permanent roads may be incurred on approval of a majority of those voting on the question.

354—Yes.

A bill for a law to amend the direct primary law by extending its provisions to presidential nominations, allowing voters to designate their choice for their party candidate for president and vice president; for direct nomination of party candidates for presidential electors; for election by party voters of delegates to their party national nominating conventions, each voter voting for one delegate; for payment of delegate's actual traveling expenses, not exceeding \$200 for each delegate, and extending the publicity rights of candidates in the state nominating and general election campaign books.

356—Yes.

A bill for a law creating a board of people's inspectors of government, providing for publication of an official state magazine, said board to be the editors and publishers thereof, the printing to be done by the state printer; all books of public officials subject to the examination by the board of inspectors and reports thereof, published in said magazine, all expenses of the board for printing and publication of the magazine, salaries, etc., not to exceed one dollar for each registered voter in the state; the magazine shall be mailed every two months to each registered voter at public expense.

358—Yes.

For an amendment of article 4, constitution of Oregon, increasing initiative, referendum, and recall powers of the people; restricting use of emergency clause and veto power on state and municipal legislation; requiring proportional election of members of legislative assembly from the state at large, annual sessions, and increasing members' salaries and terms of office; providing for election of speaker of house and president of senate, outside of members; restricting corporate franchises to 20 years; providing \$10 penalty for unexcused absence from any roll call and changing form of oath of office to provide against so-called legislative logging.

360—Yes.

361—No.

For amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon, providing for verdict by three-fourths of jury in civil cases; authorizing grand juries to be summoned separate from the trial jury, permitting change of judicial system by statute, prohibiting retrial where any evidence to support verdict; providing for affirmation of judgment on appeal notwithstanding error committed in lower court, directing supreme court to enter such judgment as should have been entered in the lower court; fixing terms of supreme court; providing judges of all courts to be elected for six years, and increasing jurisdiction of supreme court.

ORDINANCE NO. 331.

An Ordinance Providing the Time and Manner of Improving North Jersey Street from the North Line of Catlin Street to the Weyerhaeuser Tract in the City of St. Johns.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:
The Council of the City of St. Johns has ascertained the cost of improving North Jersey street from the westerly side line of Catlin street to the Weyerhaeuser tract in the city of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of the council of said city dated on the 4th day of Sept., 1910, and recorded in the office of the recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, on the 9th and 16th days of September, 1910, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the city recorder, and legal posting of notices of such improvement, as shown by the affidavit of the city engineer on file in the office of the city engineer, and no remonstrances having been filed, and, as provided by said resolution, the engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost of said improvement is \$5538.78, but shall be more accurately determined by said engineer.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that the said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at sixty days from the last publication of notice of proposals of said work, which said proposals must be filed with the recorder of said city on or before the 8th day of Nov., 1910, at 8 o'clock p. m. of said day.

That said street shall be improved as follows:
By grading same to established grade or grade to be established by cut and fill, and by sidewalking same on either side with six-foot cement sidewalks, twelve-foot curbs the entire length, with all necessary crosswalks and box gutters.

Said walks and curb to have expansion joints as directed by the city engineer; curb to have four-inch drain tile every fifty feet; hitch-rings to be placed in curb as directed by the City Engineer.

The city recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three weeks in the St. Johns Review, the official newspaper, inviting proposals for making said improvement.

Said improvement shall in all respects be done and completed in conformity with the provisions of Ordinance No. 150 except as otherwise provided in this ordinance; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against the property in the local improvement district as described in said resolution and designated as and declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 49."
