The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That the following named judges and clerks of the primary nominating election of the city of St. Johns, to be held in said city on the 27th day of February, 1911, be and they are hereby appointed as follows:

Judges for the First Ward to serve from twelve o'clock M. to seven o'clock p. m. as follows:

Section 2: That the polling place of the First Ward be and the same is hereby affixed at No. 202 South Jersey street.

Section 3: That inasmuch as it is necessary that a primary nominating election be held on the 27th day of February, 1911, as by law provided; and as the time is such as it will not permit of a delay in appointing judges and clerks to act at said election, an emergency is declared to exist and this ordinance is to become operative and be of full force and effect upon being signed by the mayor.
