There is a crying need in this state for a law similar to that in force in Pennsylvania. It provides that all papers and periodicals must have the names of the owner and editor printed in each copy. The penalty for breaking this law is a severe one. There are three or four papers in Portland which eke out a livelihood by acting as quagmires for putting all the dirty linen of the neighborhood to soak. They can with impunity assail the character of any individual and the victim is helpless. The owners of the publications are secrets that can be disclosed with extreme difficulty, and would deny ownership if brought before the bar of justice. Many people read these papers under the belief that all contained therein are absolute facts, or the owners would be sued for libel. Some of them would be sued about every ten minutes if there was any one to sue. Some of them are blackmailers of the worst type; they would hunt a man day after day until he stop the annoyance he sends a check to the editor. It will be noticed, however, that some of the victims have too much backbone to pay, as the continuous attacks will attest. Therefore a law that will abolish libelous publications is sadly needed in Oregon.

ORDINANCE NO. 367
An Ordinance to Authorize the Issuance by the City of St. Johns of Municipal Bonds in the Sum of \$6,000 to Run for a Period of Ten Years from their Date and to Bear Interest at the Rate of not to Exceed 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of Purchasing the Ferry Slips, Pontoons and Approaches at the foot of Pittsburg Street in the City of St. Johns and at the Ferry Landing on the westerly side of the Willamette River, from the St. Johns Transportation Company.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:
Section 1. That Whereas, the City Council of the City of St. Johns, Multnomah County, Oregon, did on the 21st day of February, 1911, at a regular meeting of the City Council, adopt Ordinance No. 357 entitled "Ordinance No. 357, an Ordinance authorizing a special election for the City of St. Johns and fixing a time and place and naming the judges and clerks to act thereat for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City of St. Johns a proposition of incurring a municipal bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$6000.00 for the purpose of purchasing, from the St. Johns Transportation Company, a corporation, the following property, to-wit: The Ferry Slips, Pontoons and Approaches now owned by the said St. Johns Transportation Company situated on the East Bank of the Willamette River at the foot of Pittsburg Street in the City of St. Johns, Multnomah County, Oregon, and on the West Bank of said river, opposite to the City of St. Johns, at its ferry landing on said West side of said river," which said Ordinance was passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor and attested by the Recorder on the 21st day of February, 1911, and was thereafter and on the 24th day of February, 1911, published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper published at St. Johns, the same being the official paper of said city, which said Ordinance is on file and of record in the office of the City Recorder and is hereby referred to; and

Whereas, the City Recorder caused a notice of said special election, called by virtue of said Ordinance No. 357, to be published, as in said ordinance directed and as prescribed by the charter of the City of St. Johns, which said notice was published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper, for a period of more than ten days, as is shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the City Recorder and is hereby referred to, and the legal posting of notices of said election, as in said charter provided, as is shown by the affidavit of the Chief of Police on file with the City Recorder and is hereby referred to; and

Whereas, on the 11th day of March, 1911, between the hours of 9 A. M. and 7 P. M. on said day, that said special election, as called in Ordinance No. 357, was so held in legal and regular form according to the laws and the charter of the City of St. Johns; and

Whereas, the canvassing board, duly and regularly appointed to canvass said votes at said election so held on the 11th day of March, 1911, duly and regularly canvassed said votes and did certify that there had been cast at said election on said bond question the whole number of 482 votes; and that the number of votes cast in favor of the issuance of said bonds by said City of St. Johns at said election was 460 and that the number of votes cast against the issuance of said bonds by the City of St. Johns was 22; all of which is fully shown by the certificate of said canvassing board, which said certificate is on file in the office of the City Recorder of said city and is hereby referred to; and

Whereas, that on the 14th day of March, 1911, the Recorder of said City of St. Johns duly and legally made and filed his certificate in the office of the City Recorder that at said election on the 11th day of March, 1911, the vote in favor of the issuance of said municipal bonds had carried and that their issuance was approved by the qualified electors of the said City of St. Johns; and

Whereas, it appeared that the said proposition of issuing municipal bonds, so submitted to the electors of said City of St. Johns, received more than the necessary two-thirds of the votes of the electors voting thereon in favor of the issuance of said bonds for the purpose stated in said notice of said election, and that said electors of the said City of St. Johns have thereby favored, approved and authorized the incurring of the debt necessitated hereby and has authorized the issuing and sale of bonds therefore as required by the Charter of the City of St. Johns;

Sec. 2. Now, therefore, the City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:
That the Mayor and the City Recorder of the City of St. Johns, for and on behalf of the said City of St. Johns, are hereby directed, authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of bonds of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, to the amount of \$6,000.00 in denominations of \$500.00 each, under the seal of the City of St. Johns, with interest coupons attached thereto numbered consecutively; that said bonds shall bear date of March 21, 1911, and shall run 10 years from date and bear interest at the rate of not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually from date of bonds, both principal and interest payable in United States Gold Coin at St. Johns, Oregon, said bonds and coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the Recorder of said City of St. Johns under the seal of the said City of St. Johns, and the said bonds shall have attached thereto interest coupons representing each semi-annual payment of interest and shall be made payable to bearer.

Said bonds must be sold after advertising the sale thereof in at least one local newspaper of the City of St. Johns and one Eastern newspaper devoted to financial matters. Sealed bids only shall be taken for said bonds and they shall be sold to the
