

ORDINANCE NO. 367 An Ordinance to Authorize the Issuance by the City of St. Johns of Municipal Bonds in the Sum of \$6,000 to Run for a Period of Ten Years from their Date and to Bear Interest at the Rate of not to Exceed 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of Purchasing the Ferry Slips, Pontoons and Ap-proaches at the foot of Pittsburg Street in the City of St. Johns and at the

The City of St. Johns does ordain s follows:

Section 1. 
