Why was not some of the proceeds applied in Teddy's behalf? Why discriminate in favor of an actress, even though she be fair and lovely on the stage? She was at fault when misfortune overtook her and has a husband to support her, or if he will not is able to care for herself, while Teddy is helpless through no sin of his own but of others? But it is the way of the world. A handsome young lady, smiling and attractive, is more appealing to charity than a desolate little child with no fond mother to care for it, to wipe away the childish tears, or father to protect it in its blind helplessness from the indifferent treatment of well meaning strangers, or to guide its faltering footsteps along the pathway of honor and integrity.

ORDINANCE NO. 376

An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving Jersey Street From Richmond to Fessenden, Except that part Which has Already Been Accepted, in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving of Jersey street side walk, Richmond to Fessenden, and all objections made thereon, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in the manner provided by Ordinance No. 313 to be the sum of \$4,641.31, and that the special and particular benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement and in just proportion to such benefits, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll, and said assessment roll, which is numbered 47, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:

Proposals for Street Work

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns until May 30, 1911, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the improvement of Jersey street with hard surface pavement known as Westmonte from the westerly line of Catlin street to southerly line of Richmond street, in the manner provided by ordinance No. 377, subject to the provisions of the charter and ordinances of the City of St. Johns, and the estimate of the City engineer, on file.

The engineer's estimate of the cost is \$29,813.00. Bids must be strictly in accordance with printed blanks, which will be furnished on application at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns. And said improvement must be completed on or before 90 days from date of the last publication of notice of proposals.

No proposals or bids will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the Mayor of the City of St. Johns, certified by a responsible bank for an amount equal to ten percent of the aggregate proposal, and bonds to the amount of the contract price will be required.

The right to reject any and all bids is hereby reserved.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns: That it deems it necessary and expedient to improve Portland boulevard from the northerly line of Thompson street to the southerly line of Bruce street, in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit: By grading said portion of street to grade on a subgrade approximately 16 feet wide the entire length, said macadam to be 8 inches deep in center and 6 inches deep on both sides.

Work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon the adjacent lot proximate to said Portland boulevard, from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be local improvement district No. 60.

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable cost of said improvement of said Portland boulevard is \$11,201.98.

That the cost of said Portland boulevard improvement be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns: That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Edison street from the easterly line of Fessenden street to the westerly line of Burlington street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit: By grading said portion of street to grade or subgrade to be established, and by laying a 6 foot cement walk and 12 foot curb on both sides of said street with necessary wood crosswalks and box gutters and by placing a strip of macadam 16 feet wide in center, to be 8 inches deep in center and 6 inches deep on both sides, as directed by the city engineer.

All work to be done and to have macadam gutters placed where necessary, according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, parts of lots, blocks or tracts of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said Edison street from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be Local Improvement District No. 61.

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Edison street is \$12,039.40.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns, Oregon: That it deems it expedient and necessary to change the established grade of Filmore street, from its westerly side line of Richmond street to the easterly side line of Burlington street, in said city, from the present grade established by Ordinance No. 318, and shown on profile prepared by Charles E. Andrews, city engineer of said city, which profile bears filing date of September 6, 1910, said grade being shown by red lines drawn thereon, the proposed grade being shown by blue lines, the change therein is described as follows, viz: On center line, elevation at westerly side line of Richmond street to be and remain at 143 feet, center line at easterly side line of Charleston street from an elevation of 141.4 feet to an elevation of 133.4 feet, said line at westerly side line of said Charleston street from an elevation of 140.8 feet to an elevation of 135.5 feet, said center line at westerly side line of John street from an elevation of 132 feet to an elevation of 124 feet, said line at the westerly side line of Leavitt street, from an elevation of 124 feet to an elevation of 122 feet, said line at the easterly side line of Burlington street to be and remain as at present established at an elevation of 95 feet.
