**ORDINANCE NO. 378**  
**An Ordinance Adopting the Report of the City Engineer in the Matter of Opening of Bradford Street from Richmond Street to the Easterly Line of Out Lot "E" A. L. Miner's Addition to the City of St. Johns.**

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:  
That whereas, the city council, by resolution adopted on the second day of May 1911, directed the city engineer to make a survey of extension of Bradford street as the same would appear, from the easterly line of Richmond street to the easterly line of Out Lot "E" A. L. Miner's Addition to the city of St. Johns, and to make a plan of the same and a written and complete description of the proposed change and extension thereof, which said resolution is hereby referred to and made a part hereof, and  
Whereas the city engineer within twenty days thereafter did make and file said plan, and written description of the lands to be required in the proposed change and extension of said street with the city recorder of said city, which description is as follows, to-wit:  
Belonging to the O. R. & N. Company, beginning at a point in the easterly line of Richmond street, in the city of St. Johns, 24 feet north of the southerly line of Bradford street produced, thence easterly at right angles to easterly line of Richmond street a distance of 130 feet, thence southerly parallel with said easterly line of Richmond street 27.88 feet, thence westerly parallel with the northerly line of O. R. & N. Co.'s right of way 130 feet to the easterly line of Richmond street, thence northerly on said easterly line of Richmond street 27.88 feet to place of beginning of a line containing in all 3524.4 square feet more or less.  
Belonging to Anna Merrill—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Richmond street, in the city of St. Johns, 24 feet north of the southerly line of Bradford street produced, thence northerly along said easterly line of Richmond street a distance of 32.12 feet, thence easterly at right angles to the said easterly line of Richmond street, a distance of 130 feet, thence southerly parallel with the said easterly line of Richmond street 32.12 feet to the northerly line of the O. **An Ordinance Adopting the Report of the City Engineer in the Matter of Opening of Crawford Street from Richmond Street to the Easterly Line of Out Lot "E" in A. L. Miner's Addition to the City of St. Johns.**

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:  
That whereas, the city council, by resolution adopted on the second day of May 1911, directed the city engineer to make a survey of Crawford street extending the same from Richmond street as to include therein all of Lot "E" in A. L. Miner's Addition to the city of St. Johns, and to make a plan of the same, and a written report, and a complete description of the proposed change and extension thereof, which resolution is hereby referred to and made a part hereof, and whereas, the city engineer within twenty days thereafter did file said plan, written report and survey with the recorder of said city, which said report is as follows, to-wit:  
To order to open Crawford street according to resolution adopted by the council May 2nd, 1911, it will be necessary to condemn the following described property, to-wit: beginning at a point in the Easterly line of Richmond street north 25 degrees 30 minutes east, 665 feet from the south west corner of the Williams Caples D. L. C. in Section 12 Township 1 N. R. 1 W. WM. and which marks the southwesterly corner of the plot of ground owned to A. L. Miner; thence north 25 degrees 30 minutes, east 60 feet to the northerly line of Crawford street, thence south 65 degrees 30 minutes east 132 feet to the easterly line of said plot; thence south 25 degrees 30 minutes west 50 feet, thence north 65 degrees 30 minutes west along the southerly line of Crawford street to the place of beginning, containing 7920 square feet, more or less.  
Also out lot "E" A. L. Miner's Addition to St. Johns 500 square feet.
