An Ordinance Providing The Time And Manner Of Improving Baltimore Street from the Westerly Line of Jersey Street to the Easterly Line of Edison Street in the City Of St. Johns, Oregon.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as

The council of the city of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Baltimore Street from the west-erly side line of Jersey street to the easterly line of Edison street in the city of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of the council of said city dated on the 13th day of June, 1911, and recorded in the office of the recorder of said city,

engineer Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement said work, which said proposals must be alled with the recorder of said city on or before the 8th day of August, 1911, at eight o'clock p. m. of said day.

That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the estab-lished grade by cut and fill and by sidewalking same on either side with 6

ORDINANCE NO. 403

An Ordinance Regulating the Connection of Public Service Pipes or Other Conveyors Located in Streets to the Curb Line Prior to Hard Surfacing the Same, and Declaring an Emergency.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as

Section 1. That from and after the ssage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corpora-t on to lay any hard surface pavement in any street in said city under any con-tract with said city without first connecting or having connected to the curb line all public service pipes and conduits, either for gas, water or other conveyors which now are or may hereafter be imsedded in such street or screets so to be nproved in the manner hereinafter pro-Section 2. When it shall be determin-

ed to improve any street or part thereof with any form of hard surface pavement

where the same is to be extended from curb to curb, it shall then be the duty of the city engineer to notify all holders of public service franchises whose pipes or conveyors are located as defined in Section One of this ordinance that such pipes or conveyors are to be connected to the curb lines. On receipt of such m tice served on any agent or manager of any such frauchise holding company, a not later than 48 hours after date o shall ale with the city engineer a bid or price for which it or he will extend said onnections to the curb, said engineer at the time of giving the notice herein provided for shall also farnish notice to at least two other and separate persons, firms or corporations who furnish in the same line as the said franchise holder, a notice that bids will be received at his office until a reasonable time in said notice specified for extension of such connections to the curbs, and inviting such parties so notified to submit bids for do-

ng said work.

Section 3. When the time fixed as provided in the last section for submitting bids shall have expired said engi-neer shall open all bids received, and having endorsed his certificate as to the best bid thereon shall file all bids with he city recorder who shall at once notity the successful bidder. Among equal bidders the franchise holder whose property is to be attached to shall be given preference.

Section 4. All bids as herein provided for, except that of the franchise holder shall be accompanied by a certified check payable to the mayor of the city of St. Johns, conditioned that such bidler shall commence work within three days after award and prosecute the work to completion.

Section 5. No water connections shall be less than 3-4 inch pipe. On all occu-pied property the location of connections shall as far as practicable be done in compliance with the wishes of the owner of abutting property; in all other cases where indicated by the city engineer, ex-cept where specially provided by Ordinance No. 16. All excavations as in this Ordinance provided shall in refilling be tamped thoroughly and to the satisfac

tion of the city engineer, Section 6. For all the plumbing, gas fitting, electrical or other work which shall be required under the provisions of this Ordinance, payment shall be made in like manner and at the same time that contractor or contractors are paid for other work done in the improvement of said street.

Section 7. Whenever it shall become necessary in the course of constructing any hard surface street improvement to disarrange any private or public water drain the contractor for such improvement shall provide all necessary labor and material to restore such drain to and material to restore such drain to thorough working condition and see that Regular \$40.00 sale price. \$27.50 is hereby reserved. By order of the City Council, all work be done in workmanship like manner, and thereafter file receipted bills with the city engineer covering such work, which amount, if found correct by said engineer, shall be figured and merged in the contract price of laying said pavement.

Section 8. In the interpretation of any of the provisions or requirements of this Ordinance the decision of the city engineer shall be final and conclusive as to method of connection; in all other matters appeals may be had to the coun-

Section 9. Any person, firm or cormeanor, and upon conviction therefor before the municipal court of said city be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than the old stand, 104 South Jersey.

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
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
