It is interesting to note that among the non-fiction books the travel and history, classified as the 900's, have the largest circulation with a close second in the 600's or useful arts, which include engineering, agriculture, the mechanic trades and domestic economy. The other classes ranked as follows after useful arts:

100's or periodicals; 300's or sociology, including law, political economy and fairy tales; biology and 800's or literature with exactly equal circulation; 700's or fine arts, including photography, painting, music and amusements; 500's or natural science, including nature books; 200's or religion; 100's or philosophy and conduct of life.

As cooler weather brings inclination for more serious reading and study the non-fiction circulation will doubtless show a material increase and it may be that the order of the classes will be changed.

The library is indebted to the Christian Science society of St. Johns for copies of the authorized life of Mary Baker Eddy and of Mrs. Eddy's books Science and Health.

John E. Kilkenny has presented the library with back files of a number of technical magazines including the Western Electrician, Electrical Review and Electrical World. They will prove invaluable to students along these lines.

Through the kindness of James Taylor the Daily News will hereafter be left at the library each evening. The Telegram and Journal have been furnished from the first as well as the St. Johns Review.

Sufficient funds have been received from the charge copies to secure two new volumes of late fiction; Miss Giboie Gault by Boshier and Ailsa Page by Chambers.
