

School Absence Barred

That labor permits to school children under 14 years of age can only be issued during the vacation period and that schooling or age certificates to children between the ages of 14 and 16 years will not excuse parents from observing the compulsory school law is the construction placed on the child labor law passed by the last legislature by Attorney General Crawford.

The interpretation of the law is given in a letter to Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, secretary of the Child Labor Commission at Portland. In reply to her question as to whether labor permits can be issued to children under 14 years of age on Saturdays and after school hours, the Attorney General says that they cannot and adds that the law only contemplated their issuance during vacation periods. He also says that while schooling or age certificates may be issued to the pupils between the ages of 14 and 16 years that they will not act as an excuse for the parents to violate the compulsory school law.

Mrs. Trumbull also sends Mr. Boyd the following notice: Please note that the compulsory age limit has been raised from 14 to 16 years. Permits to stay out of school or to go to work cannot be given to any child under that age unless he shall have graduated from the grammar grades and is over 14 years of age.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns, Oregon:

That whereas, for the purpose of protecting the City of St. Johns and the inhabitants thereof from extortionate charges for rock to be used in the improvement of streets, said city has heretofore purchased, and now owns, a rock quarry and crushing plant, situate in Whitwood Court, opposite said city. That said city did for some time operate said quarry and rock crusher as a municipal enterprise, that in so operating said quarry and crusher, large sums of money were expended, the same being greatly in excess of all revenue derived therefrom.

Wherefore, as a means to accomplish the ends for which said quarry and crusher were purchased, the Council of the City of St. Johns did enter into a contract to and with the "Whitwood Quarry and Contract Company," a corporation, by the terms of which contract, the said Whitwood Quarry & Contract Company does bind itself to furnish all crushed rock which may be required for street improvement purposes in the said City of St. Johns, and at a price fair and reasonable to to any and all street contractors, and to all property owners paying for such street improvements, which price being greatly reduced from any price which the said city could make and yet operate said quarry and crusher in a manner to pay operating expenses, under municipal supervision. That the price made on street rock by the said Whitwood Quarry & Contract Company having by the City of St. Johns been made the basis of calculation of the cost of all rock on streets.

Therefore be it further resolved, that for the reasons and purposes hereinbefore set out, any and all contractors now holding contracts with the City of St. Johns for the improvement of any street or streets, as well as all contractors who may hereafter secure such contracts, are hereby directed and required to secure the rock required for such contracts, at the City rock quarry, unless said contractors would be thereby unreasonably delayed, owing to said quarry being operated to its capacity on existing contracts with the city of St. Johns. Adopted by the council this 31 day of October, 1911.

Chambers and Walter Speed, three disinterested free holders of the city of St. Johns, and possessing the qualifications of jurors of the circuit court of Multnomah county, be and they and each of them are hereby appointed as viewers to assess the damages and benefits to the respective lots, blocks and parcels of land proposed to be condemned in the proposed opening of said street, as aforesaid, as well as the benefits of property particularly benefited thereby, and that each of said viewers shall qualify at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., October 24, 1911, and proceed to assess the damages and benefits as prescribed in Sections 82-83 of said charter.
