County Teachers' Institute

The annual county institute for the teachers of Multnomah county outside of school district No. 1 will convene for a three-day session at the St. Johns High School building at 9 o'clock next Monday morning. The teachers of Portland will not be required to attend this meeting for the reason that Superintendent Robinson has announced that he will credit their attendance at grade meetings each week as "Institute attendance."

Mr. Robinson states also that by holding the meeting for the county teachers alone he can better adapt the instruction to the need of the county schools. An evening session will be held on Tuesday to which the citizens of St. Johns are cordially invited. The evening program will consist of "A half hour with Ben Hur and other selections" by C. W. Harlan of Indiana and an address by Edward O. Sisson of the University of Washington and a member of the faculty of the Reed Institute, Portland.

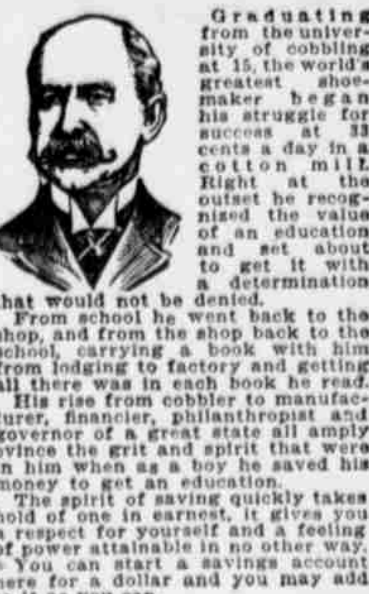
