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Have you joined the push club?

Gypsy Smith was a little unfair
at one of the meetings held in Port-
land when he stated before a com-
pany of Salvation Army soldiers
who had come to hear him speak,
that they carried their religion on
their sleeves instead of in their
hearts. The Salvation Army will
reach lower down into the dregs
of degradation in the hope of saving
a soul than any other religious or-
ganization. Their habit of dress
was adopted more as a protection
than anything else. Even the low-
est specimen of humanity to be
found in the saloons has at least a
little respect for a lassie attired in
the Salvation Army garb. Their
religion takes a most practical turn.
They feed the hungry, clothe the
naked and do not send the money
they raise with so much difficulty
to a foreign shore. Without salary
they stand shivering on a street cor-
ner on a cold, windy day beside a
receptacle to catch the few pennies
of the passerby in order that the
poor might have a cheerful Christ-
mas. "Judge not lest ye be
judged" is a scriptural quotation
that is not worked overtime these
days.

The McNamaras have confessed
to the diabolical outrage at Los
Angeles, when the Times building
was blown up and 21 lives were
lost. It is well that they have
made this confession. All the evi-
dence in the world would not have
convinced many labor organizations
and their sympathizers that the Mc-
Namaras were guilty. Gompers
says he would not have had them
confess. Haywood says he would
not have confessed had he been
guilty of the Idaho outrage of a
like nature. Thus it will be seen
that in some quarters it was not
justice that was wanted—it was ac-
quittal. The stigma it might cast
upon the organization was feared
the most. But it is no stigma. The
sooner organized labor gets rid of
undesirable elements the better. Au-
thority never was a benefit and never
will be, and labor makes a sad
mistake when it upholds and con-
dones it. They must be just as ac-
tive in punishing the guilty as they
were to aid in the defense before
guilt was acknowledged. Public
sentiment will never favor any or-
ganization when it shows a disposi-
tion to shield the guilty. Detective
Burns, in spite of all calumny cast
upon him, has again made good.
"Appeal to Reason" should make
him a most abject and humble apolo-
gizer. Organized labor will no
doubt look deeper into the merits of
the case hereafter before rushing to
the defense of one of their number,
since it has been proven that even
a union man might be guilty of murder.

Darrow has placed himself in an
undesirable light, to say the least,
in the McNamara trial. He admits
that he knew all along that his cli-
ents were guilty, yet he used all
the powers of his being to thwart
justice, even terming it a "damnable
conspiracy." No wonder Harry
Orchard's tale was discredited with
this same Darrow on the de-
fense. It leads one to wonder that
if Burns and Fredericks had charge
of the prosecution in the Idaho out-
rage might not the result have
been different. Darrow admits
that he did his best to defeat jus-
tice at Los Angeles in a case almost
similar. Haywood states that he
would never confess even if he was
guilty. One can draw his own con-
clusions therefrom. A lawyer that
upholds and therefore sanctions
crime is, in our opinion, as guilty
as the criminal. No wonder the
Los Angeles case, before the con-
fession, was dragging along with
little progress being made. It took
time to "prime" the jurors to make
conviction impossible.
