They must be just as active in punishing the guilty as they were to aid in the defense before guilt was acknowledged. Public sentiment will never favor any or ganization when it shows a disposition to shield the guilty. Detective Burns, in spite of all calumny east upon him, has again made good. 'Appeal to Reason" should make him a most abject and humble apology. Organized labor will no doubt look deeper into the merits of the case hereafter before rushing to the defense of one of their number, since it has been proven that even a union man might be guilty of murder.


