A combined statewide effort is to be made this year, in Pennsylvania, to elect members to the legislature who will vote to enact a law abolishing the custom of treating—An Anti-Treating Law. A bill making it a criminal offense for anyone to give or accept a treat at the bar or anywhere else on the premises of any licensed hotel or drinking place; an offense punishable with a heavy fine, and the revoking of the license and half of the fine to go to the informer. It is urged by the promoters of the bill that such a law will be the means of preventing bar-room loafing as well as criminal suits which originate from accidents and deaths caused directly by excessive drinking by mixed or indiscriminate crowds.

High schools throughout the state and a number in Oregon and Washington have accepted the invitation of the University of California to compete in the second Pacific Coast Interscholastic meet to be held on the campus April 26 and 27. The meet to which the St. Johns High among others in this vicinity has been invited, will undoubtedly be the most important event on the coast in the realm of high school athletics. This meet is an annual event.

On petition of Ben Reiland and others, Representative Lafferty has asked the post office department to establish a new post office in Multnomah county, five miles out on the Oregon Electric Railway, to be known as Multnomah.

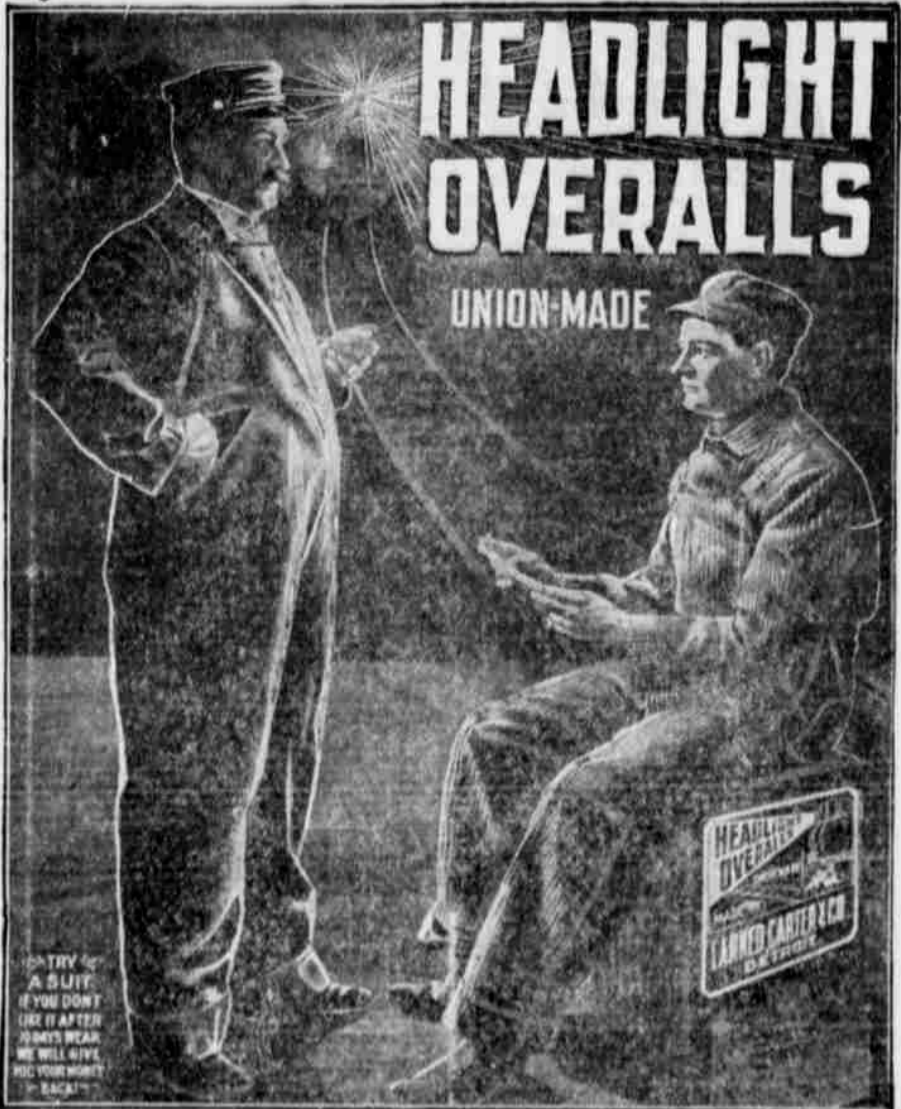
