ORDINANCE NO. 466

An Ordinance Providing The Time And Manner Of Improving Myers Street from Fessenden Street to Thompson Street in the City of St. Johns, Oregon.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows: The council of the city of St. Johns, having ascertained the cost of improving Myers street from the northerly side line of Fessenden street to the southerly side line of Thompson St.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at sixty days from the date of the publication of notice of proposed improvement.

That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the established grade by cut and fill and by sidewalk same on either side with concrete sidewalks, 12 feet cement concrete curb, together with necessary cement cross-walks and corrugated iron gutters.
