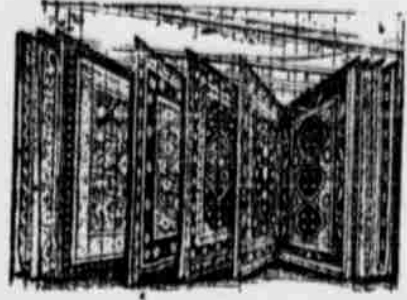

### Council Proceedings

All members were present at the next to last regular session of the city council, Mayor Couch presiding.

In honor of Councilman Hill's marked activity and well known tendencies toward annexation, some thoughtful party draped his chair in deep mourning. Pascal is a hard fighter, but a splendid loser, and took the joke in the happiest of humor, as it was expected that he would.

Requests for fire hydrants on Central avenue at Alma and Buchanan streets were referred to the water and light committee by the mayor.

A petition to improve S. Hayes street was referred to the street committee.

A. M. Stearns asked for permission to improve the south end of Decatur street that runs through his property. Granted on motion Alderman Davis.

The draymen of the city asked that the dray license ordinance be repealed. The draymen requested the passage of the ordinance originally, but they now conclude that protection is more burdensome than free trade. On motion of Ald. Hill a repealing ordinance was ordered drawn.

Bills to the amount of \$915.32 were ordered paid on motion of Alderman Muck; all yes.

Several vacancies occurring in the election boards, the following were substituted: Mr. Leggett in place of Mr. Martin; Mr. Royer in place of Mr. Fletcher; Fred Couch replaces J. E. Hiller.

Time and manner ordinances providing for the improvement of Myers street, between Fessenden and Thompson, and Seneca, between Fessenden and St. Johns avenue were passed on motions of Aldermen Horsman and Valentine, respectively.

An ordinance providing for appropriating money from the general fund to pay the excess cost on the Edison street improvement was passed unanimously on motion of Alderman Valentine.

On motion of Ald. Hill it was decided to let the salaries of city officials ride for the next year at the present rate.

The matter of payment of attorney fees for the policemen who were involved in the famous Hindu imbroglio and which was left in the hands of the finance committee for further investigation, was broached by Alderman Perrine. He wanted the question settled at once, as did Alderman Bredeson. Mr. Perrine stated that he was in favor of payment of the fees by the city, and wanted his sentiment to go on record before election. The finance committee, however, declared it was not ready to report, and the question did not get to issue.

Thus endeth the 51st chapter of the 1911-12 history of St. Johns.

### Think This Over, Voter

I deem it my duty to the citizens of this city to bring fresh to their minds what some of the present candidates for office for this city has done heretofore, and we have no reasons to believe that they would do better if they were elected again. Now, you all will remember when Mr. A. W. Davis was in office what he did for the benefit of St. Johns. He was instrumental in letting and leasing to the milling company the foot of Burlington street and the southerly half of Bradford street for about 600 feet, so that owners of property on the northerly side of said street had to put this siding on their own land, for there was not room enough to put in another siding on this northerly half of Bradford street. If you will remember that I, the undersigned, did go to the mayor, Mr. Hendricks, and told him that the milling company was putting up a water tank at the foot of Burlington street. I persuaded him to call a special meeting of the council for the purpose of ordering the milling company off of Burlington street. The order was made, and the milling company commenced to take up the cement piers that had been put in as foundation for the water tank. Then, all at once, work stopped, and it was stated by several citizens that Mr. Davis had been to see the milling company—and you could see why the mill company did stop taking out the piers. And now Mr. Davis has come out for mayor of this city and has on his cards "a safe and sane business administration," and says if elected he would have the water company reduce its price of water, and so on. Now I think, if the said A. W. Davis is elected mayor of St. Johns, he will do as he has done heretofore regarding the interest of the citizens of St. Johns. It is evident that he wants the office, and I think he wants it for the money that is in it. Now I do think that every sane voter in St. Johns can see why the said A. W. Davis did place on his cards the proposition of getting cheaper water if he was elected mayor. Now I investigated this franchise years ago, and the only way that water can be forced to Portland prices is to go into Portland, or have voters appointed to appraise the water company's utilities, and after the appraisal has been made this offer to the water company, and if the water company refuses the offer, then the council could call an election for the purpose of voting bonds to put in a water system. This is the only way that this water question can be regulated at the present time. Now I do think that all that would vote for a party that would try to pull the wool over their eyes would vote against the best interests of the citizens of St. Johns, Oregon.

As for the others that have been or are now on the council: The sewer was received before it was finished, and the warrants were issued the next day, so I understand, and the said sewer was not in a condition to be accepted. This looks as though there was something more than friendship to this, and I do not think any one that has been elected to serve the people and are sworn to protect the best interests of the people should do this. Now do you think the council did for the best interests of the people when they accepted that sewer before it was finished, and it is not a good sewer today. Any one can go and investigate the said sewer. Then you will know whether you want to place them in power again. Now the names of the parties that voted for this sewer are Messrs. Valentine, Davis and Muck. Those that voted against the acceptance are Messrs. Hill, Horsman and Bredeson; Mr. Perrine was absent, and the mayor voted for acceptance. If Mr. Couch had voted against it it would have been lost, and then we would have had a good sewer before having to pay for it. These are records, and cannot be disputed.
