Stockyards at Maegley

St. Johns will almost have an independent stockyards within a short time, if present plans of the railroads, the Puget sound packers, independent Portland packers and livestock interests are carried out. The proposed site of the new stockyards is at Maegley Junction, near the East St. Johns depot, where unexcelled railroad transportation facilities are assured. The announcement is also made that the Good Packing Co. will erect a million dollar packing plant right beside the above mentioned, to be ready in ninety days.
