

Trading At Home

When you desire to raise money to put through a business proposition in town or county, do you seek it from capitalists in some distant city? Well, not very often. You go down the street calling on everyone in sight, and come back on the other side. And yet some of us, who have often asked for business favors of our home people in the past, and will ask for them again, do not hesitate to spend money freely and heedlessly in patronizing the merchants of other cities; often, too, to our distinct disadvantage and regret. It is an excellent principle in business to stand by the people that stick by you. The man who buys everything possible at home creates a circle of business friends who appreciate his loyalty and would like to return it as far as they can. These business relations lead to personal friendship, and they bring returns, not from ties of neighborliness and good fellowship.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns, Oregon:

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Fessenden street from the northerly line of Jersey street to the northerly line of Smith avenue in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit:

By grading said portion of street to subgrade, to be established according to the profile filed by the city engineer in the office of the city recorder June 10th, 1912, by laying a standard concrete pavement six inches thick from curb to curb.

Said work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, blocks and parcels of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto, upon, adjacent or proximate to said Fessenden street, from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district is hereby declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 88."

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said street is \$6,164.62.

That the cost of said street is to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns, except that each front foot shall bear its pro rata cost of said assessment instead of the cost of improvement immediately in front of it, as provided by the city charter.

Proposals for Street Work

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns until July 9th, 1912, at 8 o'clock p. m. for the improvement of Burlington street from the northerly line of Bradford street to the center line of Block No. 29, James John's Second Addition, in the manner provided by Ordinance No. 484, subject to the provisions of the charter and ordinances of the City of St. Johns, and the estimate of the city engineer, on file.

Engineer's estimate is \$14,112.14. Bids must be strictly in accordance with printed blanks, which will be furnished on application at the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns. And said improvement must be completed on or before 60 days from date of the last publication of notice of proposals of said work.

No proposals or bids will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the Mayor of the City of St. Johns, certified by a responsible bank for an amount equal to ten percent of the aggregate proposal.

The right to reject any and all bids is hereby reserved.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns, Oregon:

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve S. Ivanhoe street from the northerly line of Mohawk street to southerly line of Richmond street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit:

By grading the said portion of street to grade and by laying six foot cement sidewalks and 18 foot curb on both sides of said street, with the necessary cement crosswalks and corrugated iron gutters, said improvement to be in accordance with specifications in Ordinances Nos. 100 and 302.

Work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, blocks and parcels of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be local improvement district No. 89.

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said street is \$1,487.62. That the cost of said S. Ivanhoe street improvement is to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns, except that each front foot shall bear its pro rata cost of said assessment instead of the cost of improvement immediately in front of it, as provided by the city charter.
