At last, after years of longing and unavailing effort, the hard surfacing of Dawson street is about to come to pass. The contract was let Tuesday evening to the Star Sand Co, and 60 days' time is given for for the completion of the work. Undoubtedly this is the most important street improvement ever effected in St. Johns. It is the real artery of traffic to Portland, and heretofore during the wet season has been practically impassable. The city attorney was especially active in clearing away any legal debris and other impediments toward the improvement of this important thoroughfare, and that the contract is now let is due to his celerity and manner of brushing all obstacles sside. The city council backed up his efforts at every turn and promptly squelched all interference. A. S. Benson and H. E. Harris also accomplished splendid work in disintegrating opposition and aiding in finding a way out of the tangle.
