Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the recorder of the city of St. Johns, until Sept. 24, 1912, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the improvement of Fillmore street from the northerly line of Philadelphia street to the southerly line of St. Johns avenue, in the manner provided by ordinance No. 594, subject to the provisions of the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns and the estimate of the city engineer on file. Engineer's estimate is \$17,235.29. Bids must be strictly in accordance with the printed blanks, which will be furnished on application at the office of the recorder of the city of St. Johns. And said improvement must be completed on or before 60 days from the date of the last publication of this notice. No proposals or bids will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the Mayor of the City of St. Johns, certified by a responsible bank for an amount equal to ten per cent. of the aggregate proposal. ORDINANCE NO. 504

An Ordinance Providing the Time and Manner of Improving Fillmore Street from Philadelphia Street to St. Johns Avenue in the City of St. Johns, Oregon.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The council of the city of St. Johns, having ascertained the cost of improving Fillmore street from the northerly side line of Philadelphia street to the southerly side line of St. Johns avenue in the city of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of the council of said city, dated on the 6th day of August, 1912, and recorded in the office of the recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, on the 9th day and the 16th day of August, 1912, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the city recorder, and legal posting of notices of such improvement, as shown by the affidavit of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder; and remonstrance filed by property owners considered and rejected on account of insufficient area represented in improvement district, and, as provided by said resolution, the engineer's preliminary estimate of cost of said improvement is \$17,235.29, but shall be more accurately determined by said engineer.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at sixty days from the last publication of the resolution of said work, which said proposals must be filed with the recorder of said city on or before the 24th day of September, 1912, at 8 o'clock, p. m., of said day.

That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the established grade by cut and fill and by sidewalk same on either side with six foot cement sidewalk, 18 foot curb on each side, together with all necessary cement curbs and gutters, and by placing concrete pavement six inches thick from curb to curb; said walk and curb to have expansion joints as directed by the city engineer said curb to have three inch drain tiles every fifty feet and hitch rings to be placed in the curb as directed by the city engineer.

The city recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, the official newspaper, inviting proposals for making said improvement.

Said improvement shall in all respects be done and completed in conformity with the provisions of Ordinance Nos. 160, 302 and 463, except as otherwise provided in this ordinance; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against the property in the local improvement district as described in said resolution and designated as and declared to be Local Improvement District No. 92.

Passed by the council September 6, 1912.
