The Bonville System

The following questions and answers have been taken from the Bonville Square Deal regarding the Bonville System:

(Continued from last week.)

Q. Can a man purchase stock in another man's name?

A. No; with the exception that children may purchase for themselves by having their parents, parents by adoption, or legally appointed guardians, sign with them. This is simply a point of law that is generally recognized in cases of this character, and when said children become 21 years of age they will come into full and rightful ownership of the same and be under no jurisdiction of the above mentioned authorities. In this manner, and in this manner only, may one sign for stock in another man's name; and this, in fact, does not come under that heading, as the proper authorities are necessary to legalize the signature of a child.

It is improbable that a man would give out money for other people to purchase stock for him when he knows that an agreement to such an effect, if verbal, is not binding, and that if written contract to such effect, be drawn up the same could not be enforced on account of the company recognizing only the direct purchaser of the stock as the owner of the same. If a man were to make arrangement in secret with a friend for a deal of this character, and his friend die, and the company recognizing only the direct purchaser, deals only with the heirs of said purchaser after his death, where does the man who put up the money make on the proposition?

If a stockholder use his stock as collateral, or use the earning power (unpaid dividends) as a means of securing a loan, or placing of such as collateral in any way, he is, according to agreement signed by himself at the time of his purchase of said stock (as arranged for in the by-laws of the company), guilty of a misdemeanor for which he must forfeit all earnings of his stock in the company in which he is guilty of this misdemeanor for the period of one year, it being then restored to him. This penalty being renewed and enforced as often as the offense is committed.

Q. Why should the promoter take more chances than the investor?

A. It is the one safe and sure way of protecting the public from fake promoters. It insures the validity of the proposition so far, at least, as its development and success in the belief of the promoter. They cannot afford to promote a proposition wherein, to his knowledge, there is the least possibility of failure.

Q. Will all favor the introduction of a system of this character?

A. No. We will always have cranks and pessimists who will argue the impracticability and insincerity of this system and its motives and principles. These men would argue that the ocean was a body of fresh water if some one would oppose their views.

Q. Will people buy stock in companies organized under the Bonville System?

A. Yes; if they understand any, or even the least, of its principles.

Q. But why tie up your stock for 99 years?

A. This question is being repeatedly asked, and comes under the heading of being important to all interested people. Did you, Mr. Man of Moderate Means, Mr. Man of Wealth, and you, Mr. Man of Poverty, ever stop to think that at the present time the longest legal contract is for 99 years? Do you ever say to your friend that 99 years is longer than you ever expect to live and that you do not intend to tie up your stock for that length of time where you would never be able to get any good out of it? After you say that does it ever occur to you that you are speaking in thoughtless haste and that there is a possibility of your being mistaken?

No?

Perhaps after you have thoroughly studied the contents of "The Bonville Square Deal" you will go to that friend and tell him that you spoke too hastily, and had no grounds upon which to make the statements you did concerning the tying up of stock.

Some of your arguments are irresistibly complete and decisively final. Of course it is a cut and dried fact that you are going to get all the good out of your fortune before you pass from this world, and you are going to spend every red cent of it before you die or know the reason why. Yes, and even more, you are not going to leave your wife and children anything for sustenance after you are gone. This is your argument, is it not? And still further, that if you should not succeed in spending quite all your earthly endowment, you will, of course, put what is left in your pocket, and take it with you into the land of the unknown.
