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That St. Johns "do grow" none can deny. The fact that 132 more pupils enrolled this year than last in the public schools is convincing evidence that this must be true. It must also be undisputable evidence that St. Johns is rapidly approach ing, if it has not already reached, the 6,000 mark. Other evidences are an increased and insistent demand for vacant houses, which is keeping the realty men on the jump to supply. Verily St. Johns is on the grow and nothing can head her

It is said that the Harriman people have been investigating the water front here rather minutely of late with a view of establishing large docks for handling their San Francisco steamship business. We might suggest that they give the St. Johns dock some consideration, and if they bid high enough it is possible that they may have it even if it is necessary to change the charter to make sale. The hope will go with it that they make better use of it than St. Johns has been able to do.

It would be a wise move and a most commendable one on the part of some individuals owning broad acres of virgin land along the water front if they would donate a little of it for free factory sites. The enhancement of value of the remaining portion would more than offset the value of the donation. Much more than that, the city would be greatly benefited thereby. It requires neither a sage nor a philanthropist to foresee that such a move is not devoid of merit, neither does it come under the head of charity. It is a business proposition pure and simple in which the donor can figure himself out ahead in whatever light he views it. Isn't it better to go down in history as a public benefactor and possibly have a street or two named after you than to be remembered as a clog in the wheels of progress by keeping what you do not need or holding it at a price at which none can buy? We can submit the proposition with the utmost good grace because unfortunately we own no river frontage. 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


