

**The Bonville System**

The tree must be torn out by its roots. Take heed, therefore, and remember these few thoughts: that if a man invest money in a company organized under this system, and that man owe money to outside interests at the time of his investment, and through stock being non-transferable under this system he is the loser by the transaction; that it is not the fault of the system, but is the direct result of poor management on the part of the investor. If a man loses in purchasing transferable stock, and knowing the same disposes of this stock to another, it is pure swindle. If the man buys stock that does not mature at once into a paying proposition, and before the time of the advancement in these stocks, he should through discouragement or persuasion sell same, he is robbing himself or being robbed by the person who persuades him to sell. Practically speaking, stock transferring means robbery to some one no matter which way circumstances turn. Robbery is a crime. Not only is the one robbed the loser, but others are indirectly caused to suffer a portion of the evil effect.

Stock transferred is a greater crime against the individual and against the public welfare than bank robbery or murder.

The financial world should be governed according to the principles of justice as regards the public and the individual, even as the executive and judicial departments govern the physical action. By adopting these methods in the Bonville System in the settlement of its financial affairs, the world has found the only alternative by which justice for all can be secured and enforced for the equal benefit of all.

This system will abolish the controversy between capital and labor. If you were to try and think of all the good this system could do, providing it were applied where needed, you would never get through thinking.

**PROPOSALS FOR IMPROVEMENT BONDS CITY OF ST. JOHNS**

All of the said bonds are coupon bonds bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent, payable semi-annually, subject to all the conditions imposed, directed and stipulated by section 131 of the charter of the City of St. Johns.

The right is reserved to redeem any or all bonds at any interest period at or after one year from date.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check for two per cent. of the amount of the bid, and the said check shall be payable to the City of St. Johns, and the said check shall be retained by the City of St. Johns as damage in case the bidder to whom the bonds are awarded fails to accept and pay for the same within Fifteen days after the acceptance of the bid. The money is to be paid and the bonds are to be delivered at St. Johns, Multnomah County, Oregon.

**ORDINANCE NO. 507**

**An Ordinance Directing and Requiring the City Recorder to Sell Certain Improvement Bonds of the City of St. Johns, Multnomah Co., Oregon, in the Sum of \$32,073.38, in Denominations of Five Hundred Dollars Each, or Less.**

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That, whereas, under provisions of the charter of the City of St. Johns pertaining to said improvement bonds and the sale thereof, applications have been filed with the City Recorder by interested parties under the said charter and the bonding provisions thereof, aggregating the sum of \$32,073.38, for street improvements in the City of St. Johns; and

Whereas, under the said charter and its provisions the bond lien docket has been made up; and

Whereas, the council is hereby authorized to issue bonds in denominations not exceeding the sum of Five Hundred Dollars each, and in all equal to the total amount of the unpaid assessments; and

Whereas, there is unpaid assessments for which bonding applications have been made in the sum of \$32,073.38; and

Whereas, it is provided that bonds by their terms shall mature in Ten years from the date of the said bonds and be payable in gold coin of the United States and bear interest at the rate of not to exceed Six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to the said bonds.

Now, therefore, the City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That the City Recorder of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, be, and he is hereby, ordered and directed and required to issue Sixty-eight bonds, which shall be improvement bonds of the City of St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon, and which said bonds and coupons shall be properly signed as required by law and the charter of the said City of St. Johns, and which said bonds shall be in the following numbers, dates and denominations:
