The tree must be torn out by its roots. Not only is the one robbed the loser, but others are indirectly caused to suffer a portion of the evil

Stock transferred is a greater crime against the individual and against the public welfare than bank robbery or murder.

The financial world should be governed according to the principles of justice as regards the public and the individual, even action. By adopting these methods in the Bonville System in the settlement of its financial affairs, the world has found the only alall can be secured and enforced for the equal benefit of all.


