Voter, don't forget that one of the offices to be filled at the election next Tuesday is one in which St. Johns is particularly interested, and that is Justice of the Peace. It takes a man of good judgement, tact and a fine sense of honor to fill this position acceptably. In J. E. Williams we have such a man. He has been filling out the unexpired term of the late O. R. Downs, and he has been filling it in a capable and admirable manner. Good men for this position are often difficult to secure, and since one has been found who is willing and splendidly qualified for the office, why not keep him there? It is the only common sense view that can be taken.

The vigorous campaigns put forth by all parties and numerous office seekers will culminate next Tuesday, and what the result will be, no man can foretell. It is pretty generally conceded, however, that Wilson will win out for President, with Roosevelt and Taft making a hard run for second base, with chances largely favoring the former. The other offices to be filled are more uncertain, and it would take a prophet born with seven-teen veils to give a fair idea of whom will be elected and what of the various measures will carry. Especially is it difficult to get any line on the single tax measures, foisted by Fels the millionaire soap maker of New York, who is using Oregon as an experimental station. The result will be awaited with great interest by all.

Voter, be sure and vote for A. W. Lafferty for Congress. He is a man who has been vilified and maligned by the mouthpieces of special interests simply because he has done his duty to the people and could not be coerced or bribed into serving the interests against the people. It is seldom, indeed, that a poor man can be elected to Congress, but when one is it is an unpardonable sin if he refuses to serve the privileged interests. Lafferty has done just that. Hence the hounding on the part of the press. It is stoutly asserted that Lafferty has brought lasting disgrace on the state. No fouler charge was ever made. Had he been looked upon in this light the Washington Post, the most fashionable newspaper in existence, certainly would not have chosen him as one of a committee of five as judge at the great automobile show held in Washington the past summer. Lafferty is respected abroad. That "man is not without honor save in his own country" was never more fully exemplified than in Lafferty's case. His splendid efforts in attempting to wrest land for the benefit of settlers from the railroad companies has made bitter enemies of them and their literary mouthpieces. It is claimed that his efforts have been made solely for the purpose of securing a few dollars from settlers. It does not require a very discriminating mind to realize that Lafferty could secure thousands of dollars from the railroad companies by abandoning the fight where he could not hope to secure nickels from settlers by keeping the fight up. Lafferty emphatically denies that he has received, will receive nor expects to receive one penny for his services. It is inconceivable to some people that a man will work so earnestly for the public weal alone without hope of reward other than the satisfaction of knowing that he had done his full duty. The power of the metropolitan press is fast passing into decadence. And why not? Distortion of facts, suppression of anything that might injure the special privileged class and malignment of those who are giving their services singly for the whole people is bringing its just reward—and that is suspicion and unbelief. Every man in any way connected with the railroad companies are working against Lafferty, with few or no exceptions. The people know why, and it is not because of the fear that he might get a few dollars from settlers. Lafferty proposes to make the railroad companies observe the law—that is all. He is the people's choice, and therefore, could scarcely be favored by the interests. They do not work hand in hand. It is up to the people to send Lafferty back to Congress. It is a duty we owe to him and to the state at large.

## ORDINANCE NO. 513

An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving South Ivanhoe St. from the Southernly Side Line of Polk Street to the Northernly Side Line of Ida Street, in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving S. Ivanhoe street from the southernly side line of Polk street to the northernly side line of Ida street in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in manner provided by Ordinance No. 489 to be the sum of \$4,037.26 and that the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement and in just proportion to such benefits, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll and said assessment roll, which is numbered 86, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:

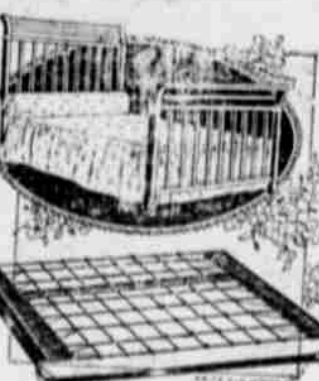
