### Parcels Post

The Honorable Postmaster  
General directs me to give the  
widest possible publicity to the  
following proposed parcel post  
regulations:

(1) That distinctive parcel  
post stamps must be used on  
all fourth class matter beginning  
January 1, 1913, and that such  
matter bearing ordinary postage  
stamps will be treated as "Held  
for postage."

(2) That parcels will be mail-  
able only at post offices, branch  
post offices, lettered and local  
stations and such number sta-  
tions as may be designated by  
the postmaster.

(3) That all parcels must bear  
the return card of the sender;  
otherwise they will not be ac-  
cepted for mailing.

Patrons are cautioned against  
purchasing larger quantities of  
ordinary stamps of large denom-  
inations than will be required to  
send fourth class mail matter  
(merchandise) prior to January 1,  
1913. On and after that date  
only the special parcel post  
stamps can be used for mailing  
fourth class matter (merchan-  
dise) and under the present reg-  
ulations postage stamps can be  
exchanged only when presented  
by the original purchaser with-  
in two days from time of pur-  
chase. —T. J. Monahan, P. M.
