To Tax Bachelors

The introduction of a bill calculated to start a stampede for Hymen's altar is being consider-ed by Representative J. H. Nolta of Multnomah county.

The bill, as contemplated, proposes nothing less than a tax on the annual income of every unmarried man over the age of 21 yaers in the State of Oregon. Another provision is that a man who is contributing to the support or maintenance of a divorced wife, or to the support or maintenance of a child or children by a wife divorced or deceased shall be exempt.
